Puzzled by Shirt-Tie Matching? Here's Tip

RALEIGH -- Shirts and ties may be the fashion trend setter for 1972, but for many men they present a puzzle: Picking the "right" tie to go with the "right" shirt. Some of the guesswork has been taken out of this daily challenge by the top brains in neckwear and shirt designing, notes Harriet Tutterow, extension clothing specialist, North Carolina State University.

Here are a few suggestions: The more conservative man may prefer the safe way out. Just wear a solid shirt with any kind of solid, striped or patterned tie, the specialist suggests. Make sure the tie repeats at least one of the shirt colors. Or, pick any kind of plain or textured weave solid color tie for a patterned shirt.

WEEKLY RECIPE

Chocolate Mint Pie

3 egg whites
Dash salt
1/2 teasp. vanilla
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup chopped nuts
3/4 cup crushed mint cookies

Beat egg whites and salt until soft peaks form, add sugar gradually and beat until stiff peaks form. With a spoon, carefully fold in crushed cookies, nuts and vanilla. Spread mixture evenly in a buttered pie pan. Cook in a 325 degree oven for 25 minutes. Cool thoroughly in refrigerator for several hours. Serve with whipped cream.
