Juniors Eligible For National Science Institute At WCU

Western Carolina University will conduct a 10-week institute this summer for high school juniors with superior ability in math.

Thirty high school students from across the nation will be selected for the institute whi-ch will be financed by a grant from the National Science Foundation.

The institute begins June 12

and ends August 18.

To meet the eligibility requirements students will have to meet three requirements: be a high school junior (albe a high school junior (al-though highly qualified sopho-mores will be considered), have at least two years of col-lege preparatory high school mathematics, but no more than three years, and have a grade of "A" in high school nathematics courses including the mathematics course being taken this year.
