WEEKLY RECIPE

Butterscotch Squares
June Lee

1 lb. brown sugar
1 cup butter
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup nuts (pecans)

Cook butter and sugar in the top of a double boiler over hot water until the sugar dissolves. Cool. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Stir in other ingredients. Spread in an ungreased 15 1/2 x 11 1/2" x 1 1/2" pan. Bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven for exactly 25 minutes. While hot, cut into squares. Makes 40 cookies.

This week's recipe was given to us by June Lee, who is the wife of Dr. Joseph Lee, and it is one that she frequently serves to guests such as members of her bridge club. The cookies are also enjoyed by the four Lee children: Nancy, Stephen, Michael and Suzanne.
