Over 600 teachers of mathematics, kindergarten through college, are expected to gather at UNC-Charlotte for the Second Annual State Mathematics Conference, November 3-4. The Conference, jointly sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the North Carolina Association of Educators, and the State Department of Public Instruction, will include over 35 different sessions, including workshops, general interest sessions, book and materials exhibits, a Friday night banquet, and a Saturday luncheon.

The meeting is built around a number of nationally known outstanding mathematics educators. Among those participating are: Dr. Mary Dolciani, Hunter College, New York City; Dr. Howard Eves, University of Maine;

Mr. Chuck Allen, Supervisor of Mathematics, Los Angeles Public Schools and Dr. John Wagner, Michigan State University. Local area teachers participating in the Conference are Connie Allison, East Elementary School, Kings Mountain.

Registration begins at noon, Friday, November 3 with the first series of concurrent sessions scheduled to start at 2:00 p.m. Activities of the Conference will conclude with a noon luncheon on Saturday, November 4.
