Kings Mountain High School has placed five nominees in the running for the coveted John M. Morehead Scholarship. The five nominees are: Tommy Shirley, Frankie Stokes, Steve Allen, Mike High, and Bob Maner. Four of the nominees traveled to the Northwestern Bank Tuesday night, Nov. 7, to be interviewed. The fifth nominee, Tommy Shirley, declined the honor to attend North Carolina State University next fall. Of the four, Bob Maner advanced to the district competition along with two other nominees from our county. The district competition will be held at Morganton around the first of January. The Morehead Scholarship is given annually by the Morehead Foundation of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The scholarship pays \$2,500 per year or \$10,000 overall toward the cost of college education. Scholastic achievements, athletic and leadership ability, are all a basis for the selection of Morehead Scholars.

Several hundred students from Kings Mountain High School attended the College and Career Day held in the Shelby High School gymnasium, Thursday Nov. 9. The day was divided into two parts; the Career Opportunities (Vocational) part was held from 9-11 in the morning, while the College section ran from 1-2:30 in the afternoon. Various industries and employers sent representatives to the morning session, while both in-state and out-of-state colleges, technical institutes, and hospitals sent representatives for the afternoon session. Junior marshals from Kings Mountain and Shelby High Schools assisted in the program.

Wound Fatal To Local Man

Charles A. "Chip" McCarter died Monday night at Charlotte Memorial Hospital from an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound suffered Saturday night.

McCarter, 18, of York Road in Kings Mountain was found by the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department at about 11:15 Saturday night at a cabin on the Lake Montonia Road. Deputy Dale Costner found the youth shot once in the mouth with a .22 caliber pistol.

Cleveland County coroner A. D. Walker reported that witnesses told him McCarter was in the cabin with several persons when he took all but one bullet from the chamber of the pistol, placed it in his mouth and pulled the trigger.

McCarter was rushed to Charlotte Memorial where he stayed on the critical list until his death Monday night. No ruling has yet been made in the death.

All students participated in a training class of their choice or relative to an office they hold. The leadership training programs were taught by the district officers.

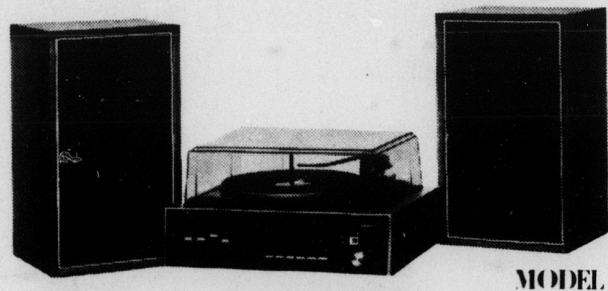
Macedonia To Honor Sr. Citizens Thanksgiving
