Kings Mountain High School has placed five nominees in the running for the coveted John M. Morehead Scholarship. The five nominees are: Tommy Shirley, Frankie Stokes, Steve Allen, Mike High, and Bob Maner. Four of the nominees traveled to the Northwestern Bank Tuesday night, Nov. 7, to be interviewed. The fifth nominee, Tommy Shirley, de-clined the honor to attend North Carolina State University next fall. Of the Bob Maner advanced four, Bob Maner advanced to the district competition along with two other nominees from our county. The district competition will be held at Morganton around the first of January. The Morehead Scholarship is given annually by the Morehead Foundation of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The scholar-ship pays \$2,500 per year or \$10,000 overall toward the cost of college education. Scholastic achievements, athletic and leadership abil-ity, are all a basis for the ection of Morehead Schars.




ter was in the cabin with several persons when he took all but one bullet from the chamber of the pistol, placed it in his mouth and pulled the trigger.


