Call For Help

Womans Editor

What do you say when a person calls and tells you she is about to take her life?

Roger Sample cannot answer that question yet he and many Hot Line volunteers have been doing just that since Dec. 6, 1973 when the program became an active "sounding board" of CODAP, Cleveland Organization Drug Abuse Prevention.'

The answering service, available countywide 24 hours a day, averages two calls per day in a 16-hour period. Volunteers are badly needed, and Sample, CODAP's drug education co-ordinator and a former psychiatric social worker, said he'd like to

recruit some male volunteers. The telephone service is primarily a listening and referral

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
