The Class of 1965 was the last class to graduate from the school on Ridge St. and the first class to begin ninth grade as a result of consolidation with Bethware, Grover and Kings Mountain Schools.

High school memories of 10 years ago were reminisced by the 150 guests who began gathering at 6:30 for a social hour and buffet dinner at 7:30. Class President Jim Cloninger of Raleigh called the meeting to order and recognized class officers, former teachers and members of the planning committee.

Park Personnel Moving

Kings Mountain National Military Park personnel will begin moving into new quarters in the near future.

This is the word from Ben Moomaw, director of the park, following final inspection of the new \$1.5 million facilities constructed in the park.

Construction began Oct. 14, 1974 and last week the completed visitor's center, amphitheater and waste treatment plant were inspected.

The visitors center features a plush theater and a large patio. The amphitheater features a rear projection film screen. Between the center and the amphitheater, considerable landscaping has been done.

Moomaw said that the park area is one of the 22 designated national Bicentennial areas in the country. He is expecting a large number of visitors to the park during the Bicentennial year, and is also expecting a few problems.

He said he is hoping to be able to increase the number of rangers at the park as well as increase security.

Asked if he expected any troubles during the Bicentennial year, especially from vandals, he said, "You can count on it."

Most of the new exhibits for the visitors center have not yet been completed, he said, and it will probably be a few

more months before the exhibits will be installed.

A small dedication is expected in October, he said, on the anniversary of the Kings Mountain battle. A second larger dedication, he said, probably be held sometime next year as part of the Bicentennial celebration.

Participating in the dedication were Moomaw; Ben Curtis, project supervisor of the National Park Service office in Denver, Colo.; Jimmy Little, project supervisor from Laxton, S.C.; and Earl Hume, head of construction at the park.
