Piedmont Washerette was broken into sometime Sunday night by a thief or thieves who snatched a new 30-cup aluminum percolator from under the counter and fled.



# Park Personnel Moving

Kings Mountain National Military Park personnel will begin moving into new quarters in the near future.

This is the word from Ben Moomaw, director of the park, following final inspection of the new \$1.5 million facilities constructed in the park. Construction began Oct. 14,

1974 and last week the completed visitor's center, amphitheatre and waste treatment plant were inspected.

The visitors center features a plush theater and a large patio. The amphitheater features a rear projection film screen. Between the center and the amphitheater, considerable landscaping has been done.
