The Kings Mountain women flew to Denver and then made the scenic trip by car.

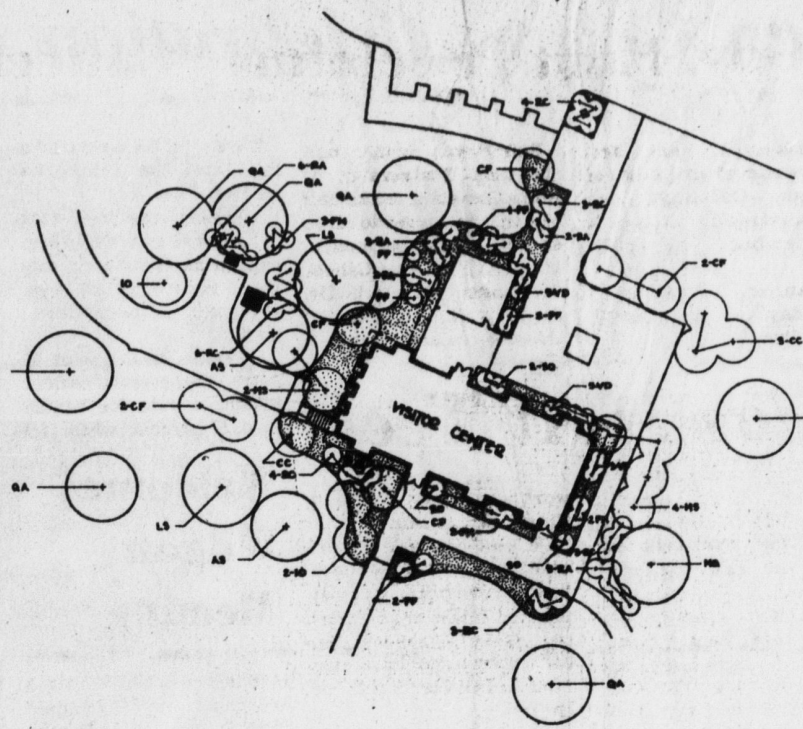
New Parents

Submit Bids For New Construction At Cowpens

Local contractors are invited to submit bids to the National Park Service through Sept. 18 for new construction at Cowpens National Battlefield in Cherokee County, S.C.

Andrew Loveless, superintendent of the Kings Mountain National Military Park and the Cowpens National Bat-

tlefield, said the 6,000 square feet brick and frame facility will house offices, and information area, lobby, a circular exhibit rotunda and an audio visual room.

The construction is expected to cost between \$385,000 and \$635,000 and will be built of wood frame and brick veneer.

Sidewalks, grading, drainage, electrical system, and paving specifications are available at the KMNPP offices, said Loveless.

Supt. Loveless said the facility will also feature an extension of a concrete plaza around the building with paved access to the monument.

School Children

To Insure Or Not To Insure

School is opening again all over North Carolina, and many parents will have to decide whether to purchase insurance on school-age young people through the schools they are attending.

The Consumer Insurance Information Division of the State Insurance Commissioner's Office has had many calls asking for an evaluation of this insurance product.

In deciding whether or not to purchase the insurance, basically known as "Scholastic Accident Insurance," several points should be considered.

Accidental death or loss of limbs benefits are available, but death or loss of limbs must occur within a specific time from the date of the accident, usually 90 days.

Many families have group insurance policies. One example is the Blue Cross-Blue Shield family plan, which carries broad coverage on all family members (including school-age children). School officials usually tell youngsters that if such comprehensive family plans are carried, additional insurance is not necessary to participate in school activities. However, this word does not always

get home to parents or guardians.

In order to fully understand "Scholastic Accident" policies, please read the policy form very carefully. The brochure outlining the benefits of the policy may not contain all the necessary information about that policy.
