To Insure Or Not To Insure

School is opening again required. Accidental death get home to parents or all over North Carolina, and many parents will have to decide whether to purchase insurance on school-age young people through the schools they are attending.

Consumer Insurance Information Division of the State Insurance Commissioner's Office has had many calls asking for an evaluation of this insurance product.

In deciding whether or not to purchase the insurance, basically known as "Scholastic Accident Insurance," several points should be considered.

These policies are usually a "limited benefit" type policy providing coverage for accidental injuries only. They are not generally

"hospitalization" type policies. Some of the usual limitations are: limited the result of the accident must be for medical or dental services which are recommended by a physician; expenses must be incurred within 30 to 90 days from the date of the accident; most policies only provide benefits for a period of 52 weeks following the accident. regardless of whether or

or loss of limbs benefits guardians. are available, but death or loss of limbs must occur within a specific time from the date of the accident, read the policy form very usually 90 days.

Many families have group insurance policies. One example is the Blue Cross-Blue Shield family plan, which carries broad coverage on all family members (including school-age children). School officials usually tell youngsters that if such comprehensive family plans are carried, additional insurance is not necessary to participate in school activities. 




