A big Christmas bazaar Saturday at First Wesleyan Church Fellowship Hall will benefit three church projects. The Circle, named for Vinelle Davis, who with her husband, Morris, are missionaries to Zambia, will use some of the proceeds to purchase supplies to send to the Morris. Additionally, the Circle has earmarked part of the funds for the church-supported orphanage, Hephzibah, located in Macon, Ga. and founded as a home for needy children six through 12. Proceeds from the bazaar will also be used for Wesleyan Indian Missions, Hot Springs, South Dakota. The Wesleyan Indian Missions' team works on 14 different Indian reservations and in towns where there is heavy Indian population. They buy, rent or erect places of worship and operate a Christian Day School program that attempts to reach the children and

parents for Christ.

Handmade crafts, a Country Store, a bake shop, ham and sausage biscuits, a candy kitchen, book table, and white elephant sale will feature the bazaar. Members of the Circle have been at work for weeks preparing bazaar items.

Doors will open at 9 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall behind the church at 505 North Piedmont Ave.

A member of the Circle said, "Our Circle would like to take

this opportunity to wish all of you a Merry Christmas. During this very festive time of year, let us not forget the true meaning of Christmas, the celebration of the birth of our dear Saviour, Jesus Christ. There would be no Christmas if God had not sent Jesus to Earth to save His people. Parents, we hope that you will all read your children the beautiful story of the birth of Jesus. It is one of the most beautiful and truest stories your children will ever hear."

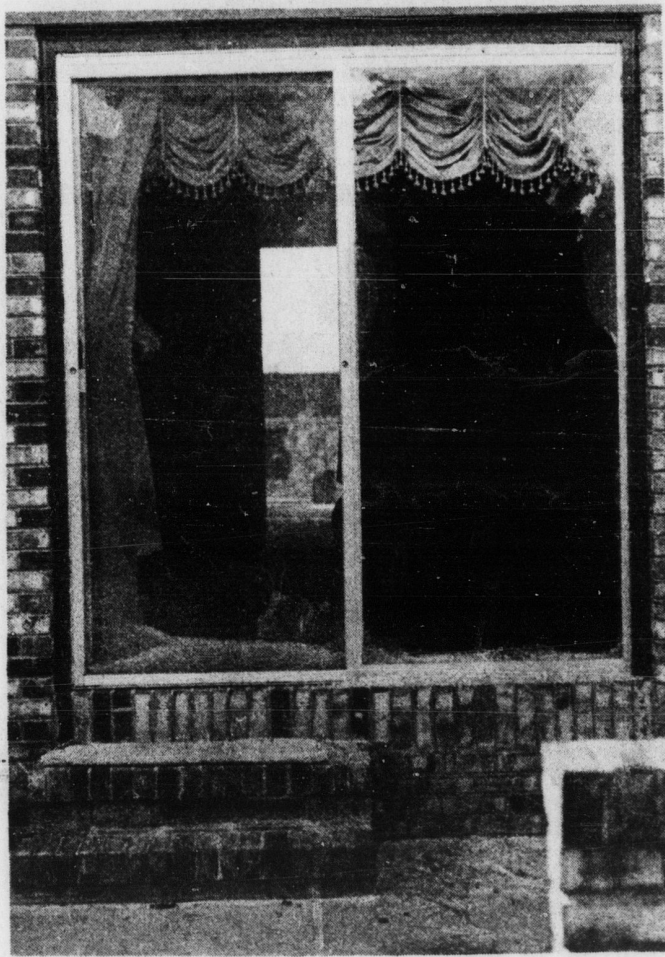

Rocks Thrown Through Doors

The Cleveland County Sheriff's Department is investigating an act of weekend vandalism which resulted in \$300 damage to an unoccupied house in the Quail Run subdivision.

According to a report filed by Det. Hugh Buff, someone early Sunday morning threw bricks and rocks through windows and glass doors of the home of Ar-

chie Crocker on Route 2, Dixon Drive.

Crocker had recently purchased the house but had not yet occupied it.

A rock and brick were thrown through two sliding glass patio doors, shattering both. A rock also broke a kitchen window and there was damage to a window frame on the rear bedroom.
