Association took the initiative to begin a high school in 1903 in its annual meeting at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. In 1904, the Association appointed fifteen trustees to begin the school. Those serving on that original Board of Trustees were: Carme Elam. E.B. Hamrick, N.B. Kendrick, L.S. Hamrick, Rev. D.F. Putnam, W.W. Washburn, L.S. Jenkins, G.W. Kendrick,

J.M. Wilson, Rev. J.V. Devinney, E.C. Borders, J.H. Quinn, A.T. Mull, G.H. Logan and Rev. A.C. Irvin. It was not until 1907 that the dream was realized, and a school known as the **Boiling Springs High School was** established. The school became Boiling Springs Junior College, Gardner-Webb Junior College, and then Gardner-Webb College. Providing the conference rooms in memory of the first Board of Trustees would be a reminder of this significant and historic action taken by the member churches of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Leadership in the Association is in the process of contacting the families of these first trustees and giving them as opportunity to share in this project. It is hoped that all families of these former trustees will participate.

The Kings Mountain Baptist Association is planning to build

their new office building on Wyke Road. The one and onehalf acre lot is adjacent to the property of Eastside Baptist Church. The associational office is presently located at 310 East Marion Street in Shelby.

It has been decided that there should be \$75,000.00 in the Building Fund before submitting the plans for construction bids. Currently, there is \$58,131.41 in the Building Fund.

A new facility will enable the seventy-two member churche to do together what they canno do alone. This takes the form d working with 170 prisoners clothing and furniture t families in need, teaching adult to read, a weekly jail ministry providing a support system t the leadership of the churches and offering support to the 36 families with children i Juvenile Court.

+Purchase only UL Listed light strings. For outdoor use, only weather proof cords and lighting should be used. The UL Label will indicate light strings suitable for outdoor use.

+Check all lights carefully. Make certain bulbs are not loose in their sockets. Use rubber light socket gaskets and replace if

+Selection of a tree, whether natural or artificial is a crucial matter. Artificial trees should be labeled flame resistant. Never put light strings on a metal tree-this is a shock hazard-use only spot lighting. Natural trees should be freshdeep green, strong scent, no falling needles and trunk butt stickly with sap. Keep trunk in water, and check it daily.

+Inspect all wiring. Watch for insulation deterioration, frayed and bare wires, lights with broken or cracked sockets, or loose connections. Unsafe equipment should be discarded immediately.

+Watch placement of electrical fixtures. Keep them out of children's reach, and never place them close to flammable material.


+Never overload circuits. By placing more current on a wire than it was intended to carry, overheating and fire can result. Look for the capacity of the wire and follow manufacturer's suggested use.

+Keep the tree and other flammable materials (mantel decorations, wrapping materials, etc.) at a good distance from fireplaces, radiators, and other high heat sources. Also, never block exits with the tree or other decorations.

+Disconnect all lights when working with them. Never stretch the strings or extension cord wiring.

+Always turn off decorative lights when leaving home or retiring. A short circuit could cause a fire while you are away.

+Keep a fully-charged fire extinguisher handy, a UL Listed Multi-Purpose, A.B.C. fire extinguisher is practical.
