Ice Major Cause Of Injury

Ice-covered sidewalks and steps were the cause of injury to literally thousands of Postal Service employeed last year, according to Postmaster Fred Weaver.

"More than 16,000 postal workers across the nation were hurt when they fell or lost their

balance," Weaver said, "and ice and snow was the primary cause of those accidents. We do everything possible to

deliver the mail regardless of how bad the weather becomes," Weaver said, "but we want to remind customers again that snow and ice on steps and sidewalks

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has to be removed where carriers must walk."

Postmaster Weaver said he realizes it's not always easy to remove ice and snow, but carriers are not requried to risk personal injury from unusual hazards to deliver the mail.

To allow a carrier to drive up to a curbside mailbox to deposit or collect mail without leaving his or her vehicle, rural or curbside boxes should be kept clear of snow, vehicles or other obstructions.

good damper or insert, it costs you money because your heat is going up the chimney.

•Let the sunshine in. Open curtains in the daytime to let heat in, and close them at night to keep it in. "Sunshine is free," said Ollis. "We don't send out a bill on that ... yet."

Tips on saving on water include:

•If your water bill is higher than normal, have your meter checked.

•Check the back of commodes. If water is above the overflow, it is running 24 hours a day and over a month's billing period will result in several dollars.

•Repair drips. A drip in the kitchen sink will cost a dollar a month.
