

The future of the child nutrition is uncertain at the federal level. Funding for child nutrition programs was reduced by \$1.5 billion for the 1982 fiscal year which begins October 1. However, the committment to adequate nutrition for all students has not changed in the Kings Mountain District Schools. The Board of Education is committed to quality education for all students. Child Nutrition is another important part of that committment.


