Seniors recommended as scholarship finalists by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation based on scores on the National Merit Qualifying Test are: Jeanette L. Frank, Dina L. Injeikian and Sharee A. Muench of Shelby High School; Lisa A. Piercy of Crest High School; Eloise K. Pfeiffer of Burns High School; and Pamela Hatch of Kings Mountain High School.

Students will be interviewed by a three-member Scholarship Committee comprised of the following area university educators: Dr. Jean Scott, Director of Admissions, Duke University; Dr. Thomas E. Mullen, Dean of Undergraduate College, Wake Forest University; and Mr. Collins E. Rustin, Jr., Assistant Director of Admissions, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The Committee will consider factors such as scholastic record, principal's endorsement, motivation, leadership and other personality characteristics. The scholarship ranges from \$500 to \$2,000 yearly, depending on the winner's financial need, which is determined by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, who administers the PPG Foundation program.

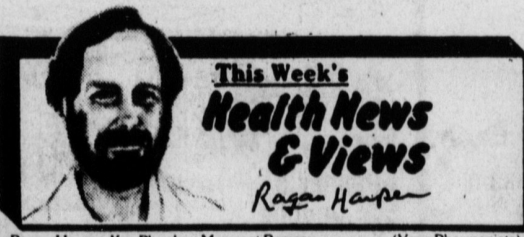

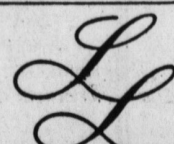
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
