
21 inmates **Die From Fire Hurts**

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. - Tragedy struck in a dormitory of the Arkansas Negro Boys Industrial School twelve miles from here and twenty-one boys lost their lives in a fire of undetermined origin last Thursday morning.

Pill Struching, an Arkansas fire marshall lieutenant, reported that fire broke out in a dormitory where 68 boys were locked in, and there was no faculty head resident in charge Governor Orval Faubus, who visited the scene, waz visibly shaken and pledged a complete investigation. He was reportealy "near tears."

Roused out of their sleep, many of the boys fied to safety by kicking out the glass windows and screens which were designed to prevent their escape But 21 inmates who were not able to escape. their charred bodies were and






