HENDERSON — A Negro textile worker's home was bombed Friday night despite apparent optimism after 17-week-old strike of Harriet - Henderson Cotton mills may be nearing its end.

Police reported a half-stick of dynamite was tossed on the front porch of the home of Arthur Morris, a stevedore worker at the South Henderson Mill, ripping a hole in the floor, breaking window panes and dislodging the house's interior. There were no injuries.
