

CLINTON - Primus Palmer, 44-year-old employee of Bonitz Installation Company, proved to the citizens of this little farming town that electricity does not always have to kill one when it passes through his body. It all happened here Thursday afternoon when Palmer, working on the new Scottish Bank Building, Elizabeth Street, came in contact with a Carolina Power & Light Company wire that is reported to have carried 3,000 volts of electricity.

The company for which Palmer works had a contract to insulate the roof of the building, it is reported and Palmer was one of the several employees who arrived here Thursday morning and began to carry out the company's

It was reported that Palmer had a one-tuch pipe in his hand and in the process of performing his duties, the pre-

came in contact with the wire and the volts passed through his body. The contact is said to have burned a hole in the pipe which was about one sixteenth of an inch deep.

The contact with the wire was realized for about two blocks in the vicinity of the building, lights
