was reportedly generally expected that incumbent Barber was going to stand for a fourth 2-year term. Barber had been elected in 1953. 1955 and 1957. In 1953 he was chosen as city treasurer by his white fellow-councilmen and held the city's purse-strings for two years.

In private life Barber is secretary-treasurer of the Excelsior Credit Union which is reputedly worth nearly a haif-million dollars. Falls is president of the financial institution which has been a bulwark in the economic life of this community for some 15 years.

Barber issued a statement thanking the citizens for all past support and stated as his reason for withdrawing from the race (he would have been automatically reelected since no person had filed against him) the condition of his health and the prompting of his physician, along with the urging of his family to reduce his work load.

It is said here that during the 1963 contest one of Barber's white opponents died suddenly and an-other became afflicted and Barper was elected. In 1955 and 1957 sarber had no serious opposition. Falls is said to have been the personal choice of Barber.
