Messages From Ike, Others Given D. C. Youth Marchers

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The calm of the Washington Monument and the serenity of the Lincoln Memorial were replaced with the voices of 30,000 American students here Saturday evening as they celebrated a two-hour parade. Those youthful Americans gave their views on integrated schools in no uncertain terms and those who

did not stop its onward march to a stinging rebuke. The marchers carried banners with such words as, "This is 1955, Not 1869," "Equal

Minds, Why not equal Education," "Free Asbury Howard" and many others which told the story of those who would have integration take over at once. The marchers came from throughout America and it was rather symbolic that there were almost as many white youths as Negro.

It was believed that the crowd far exceeded the expectation of the sponsors of the march and the Washington police, for quite a few

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Girl, 17, Kills White Mechanic; Says She Was Defending Self

NOTTOWAY, Va. — Maxine Thomas, a 17-year-old Negro girl, claimed Saturday she was attacked by the white mechanic she is charged with fatally stabbing. Commonwealth's Attorney Charles H. Wilson said the girl held here in the death of Charles Donald Jordan, 24, of Crew, said Jordan first attacked her with the knife but she managed to get the weapon away from him and stab him in the chest.

Jordan died instantly late Thursday night on a rural road near Jennings ordinary.

Another white man and a second Negro girl were at the scene but Wilson declined to release their names.

Wilson said the Thomas girl claimed Jordan had picked her up in Buickville and drove the lonely road where the car became stuck in the mud.

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Abandons Sterilization Bill

Sen. Wilbur Jolly of Franklin County abandoned his bill authorizing sterilization of unwed mothers Tuesday. He was one of the two sponsors of the bill. Jolly reported that he is instead throwing his support to a substitute measure being prepared in a Senate Committee to authorize solicitors to take unwed mothers to court if they are found not to be spending the funds of the Welfare Department for the intended purposes.

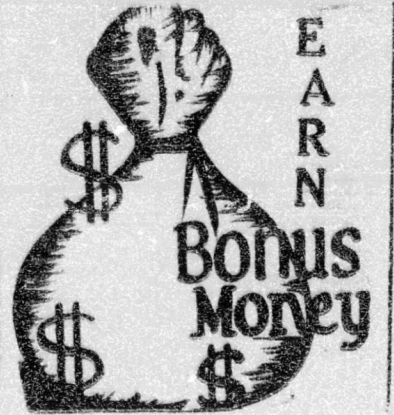

Carlton James Barber, 47, currently principal of the B. T. Washington High School, Clarkton, has been appointed the new principal of the Garner Consolidated School, Barber, who is serving his second term as president of the 10,000-member North Carolina Teachers Association, has been described as "one of the eight top principals in this state."

Comes Highly Recommended Superintendent Fred A. Smith of the Wake County Schools, told

Mr. Marriott resigned earlier this month after serving as principal for 26 years. Barber has been principal at Bladen County since 1937.

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Surprise Is Expressed At Harris' Act

The only colored candidate for the City Council, Dr. Nelson Herbert Harris, 908 New Fern Avenue, dropped out of the race last Thursday and thus saved the city some \$3,000 in the cost of a primary election. The primary had been set for April 25, but Dr. Harris' withdrawal as the 15th candidate, erased any need for it.

An educator of Shaw University, Dr. Harris said that he "wanted to save Raleigh taxpayers the \$3,000 it would have cost to conduct a primary, prior to the election on May 5."

Many Raleighites expressed surprise at his withdrawal from the race after publication in last week's CAROLINIAN of his enthusiastic platform.
