

## Worker Drowns In Freak Flood, Underground

DETROIT—(AP)—A 53-year-old eastside construction worker, Boisy Scott, was trapped and drowned last week in a freak flood 106 feet underground while digging a footing for a skyscraper on the new 23 million dollar post office at West Fort and Eighth.

Scott obtained the job just five days before the accident.

Homicide detectives said Scott dug into an artesian waterhead. He was mired immediately in mud formed by the rushing water and held fast as the water rose over his face and head.

Police said Ply James, 22, a co-worker, risked his life in a vain effort to rescue Scott. When he reached the bottom of the excavation he found Scott almost submerged.

Scott was raised to the surface and a fire department rescue squad tried to revive him.

## Bishop R. C. Ransom:

## Oldest A.M.E. Prelate Dies In Wilberforce

WILBERFORCE, O. — (AP)—The Rt. Rev. Reverend Cassius Ransom, 98, oldest prelate of the A.M.E. Church, who had been in declining health in recent years, died Wednesday at his home, Tanawanda Chimney Corners here in Wilberforce. He retired in May, 1948.

Elected to the Episcopacy in 1924 at the General Conference meeting in Louisville, Ky., at which time he concluded approximately 12 years service as editor of the A.M.E. Review, oldest Negro magazine published in the United States. During his years as bishop he served in the West Indies, Kentucky, Tennessee, Louisiana, South Carolina and Ohio, West Virginia and Western Pennsylvania at the time of his retirement.

In 1949 Bishop Ransom published a controversial autobiography, "The Pilgrimage of Harriet Ransom's Son", telling in blatant verity

much of his background and rise to one of the top positions in the church denomination. Other literary contributions by the Bishop, "Preface to A.M.E. Church History" and a book of orations. He was a gifted and eloquent speaker, much in demand throughout both church and civic circles.

His Harper's Ferry (W. Va.) speech in 1909 in a memorial observance for John Brown produced the Niagara movement which later became the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He was also the first Negro member of the Parole Board of the State of Ohio.

Funeral services were held at Wilberforce University, Tuesday, April 28. Surviving are two sons, Reverdy H. and Harold and his wife, Myrtle Teal Ransom and a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

## Honors Day Sees Many Feted At Shaw Rites

Honors Day was observed on Friday, April 24, at Shaw University by the Alpha Omicron Chapter of Alpha Kappa Mu and the Beta Kappa Scientific Honor societies. All honor students of Shaw University were recognized.

The speaker for the occasion was Dr. Walter J. Peterson, dean of the Graduate School, North Carolina State College, Raleigh. Dr. Peterson told his audience that, "We are in perhaps the most startling and the most crucial scientific revolution of all times—when man has just been handed by the scientists a product capable of destroying his world—and when the world gives strong evidence of being quite capable of indulging in the delusions and stupidities which could bring destruction down upon us."

Our primary challenge," he continued, "reads in the existence of weapons capable of our complete destruction, and the rapid emergence of Russia as an impelling, revolutionary, and all-pervading force in our greatly fore-shortened world. This means that we face implacable, able competition in all of science and technology that will require us to strive mightily but intelligently—if we are not to be surpassed in the protracted conflict with communism."

He stated that it is our task today to see that all who can read and learn gain some comprehension of this new force which continues to influence so powerfully so many aspects of life on this planet, not

only with the purpose of providing training of high quality for those able young people who wish to follow careers in the scientific disciplines, but also to ensure that our citizens are well-informed about the methods and spirit of scientific inquiry.

The spirit of science, he declared, is to set man free of superstitions, of chains, of slogans and of dogma.

In conclusion he said that all of us are going to be held to higher and more immediate responsibilities than our predecessors have ever been. We have no reason to be doubtful or fainthearted about our awesome prospect, he assured. He warned that we must not take ourselves for granted.

The speaker was introduced by H. L. Irone, advisor to Beta Kappa Chi. Remarks were made by Dean Foster P. Payne who is advisor to Alpha Kappa Mu.

Mrs. Helen Sneed, a senior from Garner, president and vice-president of Alpha Kappa Mu and Beta Kappa Chi respectively, presided over the program. ## Over Population - World's Great Problem

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ministers, doctors and welfare workers have a great responsibility in educating the general public on the necessity of birth control, agreed the four panelists who participated in the discussion: "Should Family Planning Have a Place in Public Health and Welfare Programs?"

The discussion took place at St. Thomas Church Parish Hall, Friday, at a dinner meeting sponsored by the Planned Parenthood Association of D. C.

Alfred Friendly, Editor of the Washington Post and Times Herald, moderated the panel. Dr. G. Franklin Edwards, Professor of Sociology, Howard University; Dr. Alan Guttmacher, Chief of Obstetrical Services at Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York; Charles Horsky, Attorney and president of the Washington Housing Association and the Rev. Dan Potter, executive director of the Council of Churches in New York City, composed the panel.

These experts in the field of medicine and social welfare pointed out that the overpopulated world is posing a great problem the greatest problem facing us today. And the population is steadily increasing at the rate of one and one-third per cent per annum. At that rate it was estimated that the population of the world by 2000 will be six and one-fourth billion.

UN SHOULD STUDY PROBLEM

This over population will result in unemployment, poverty, juvenile delinquency and social welfare problems. It is an important problem which should be placed in the lap of the United Nations, declared Dr. Guttmacher. "WHO (World Health Organization) is ready to go to bat on this problem," continued the New

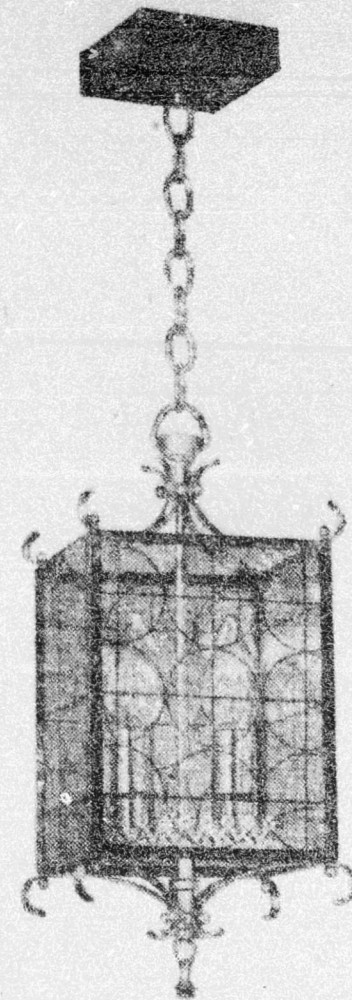

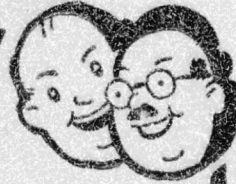
