

Worker Drowns In Freak Flood. Underground

DETROIT-(ANP) - A 53-year old eastside construction worker Boisy Scott, was trapped and drowned last week in a freak flood 106 feet underground while digging a footing for a caisson on the new 23 million dollar post office


a West Fort and Eighth. Scott obtained the job just five days before the accident.

Homicide detectives said Scott dug into an artesian waterhead. He was mired immediately in mud formed by the inrushing water and held fast as the water rose over his face and head.

Police said Ply James, 22. a coworker, risked his life in a vain effort to rescue Scott. When he reached the bottom of the excavation he found Scott almost submerged.

Scott was raised to the surface tried to revive him.






