### Church Bonus Money Rules

All purchase slips of receipts presented to your church must come from stores advertising in the CAROLINIAN.  
Each week carries a date in the Bonus Money period. Purchases eligible must come from the stores in the Bonus Money period.  
No purchase slips representing a business should be submitted. All receipts must come from individual purchases.  
All churches in Raleigh and Wake County are eligible.  
All purchase slips must bear the name of the store from which the purchase was made.  
All purchase slips should be submitted in the name of the church, and should be to the office of the CAROLINIAN the Monday following close of Bonus period.  
In order that smaller churches may have an equal opportunity to share in the Bonus Money the following regulation by church of 200 members will be awarded 1st Bonus Money consecutively, i.e. should a church of 200 or more members receive 1st Bonus Money after the first period it would have to wait until the third Bonus period to be presented 1st award again, except where church has 200 or less members, then it could win top Bonus award consecutively. However, this does not mean that second and third awards cannot be sought consecutively. Consequently every church group has the opportunity to secure an award every period.  
No purchase of over \$3.00 from any one merchant during a week can be counted.  
There is a ceiling of \$35 per person a week for grocery purchases.  
In the event of the same amount of purchases by more than one entry, the award will be divided.  
The purchase totals should be shown on each packet and total placed on the outside of the envelope carrying the period's entry along with name and address.  
Bonus money earners will be announced in the issue following the closing of each period.  
All entries remain the property of THE CAROLINIAN.

No receipts from banks will be considered except statement on mortgage.

Presiding over the colorful six-day convention was Imperial Potentate Booker T. Alexander, of Detroit, who has wielded the gavel over the 15,000-member organization since his election to office in 1951.  
Under his leadership, the popular national group now has over \$250,000 in assets, more than \$250,000 of which has been set aside to be voted upon and distributed as charitable contributions to medical research.

Any doctor, hospital, clinic or school is eligible to receive a grant from this fund provided they can qualify by certifying that they are engaged in medical research. Last year at the Chicago Convention, a total of \$37,000 was voted out for distributions among six qualifying hospitals and schools.  
Potentate Alexander refused to permit the introduction of an amendment that would raise his present \$7,500 a year salary to \$8,700 during the session.

## Open To Negroes: CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

**THE ARMY**  
Many young men and women may wish to do stints of four or five years in the army, or perhaps make a career out of it.  
Young men who want to get a college education may enroll in the ROTC programs in operation at most landgrant colleges.  
The new recruit's outfit and wardrobe consists of some thirty items of wearing apparel, from boots to woolen undershirts. The gear that is included in one's initial clothing allowance costs far more than one would have to pay for two or three suits of clothing in civilian life.  
In addition to this personal clothing issue each soldier also receives certain "organization" equipment—his rifle, bayonet, steel helmet, mess kit, canteen, steel belt, canteen, first aid pouch, belt, suspenders, etc.  
To provide for recreation Army posts are provided. Some of these functions are: American Red Cross Field Office, banks, barber shop, chapel, dry cleaning plant, theatre, quartermaster clothing store, service club, and swimming pool.  
Upon completion of basic training, the recruit will normally be granted two full weeks of leave. It is interesting to note that a soldier of the U. S. Army, one is entitled to 30 days of leave for each month he serves. This amounts to an annual 30-day vacation with full pay and allowances.  
When one graduates from high school, he may apply at once for an assignment in the Army's Technical Training Program which offers 127 courses in many career fields. One's high school guidance counselor can furnish anyone with details on how this may be accomplished.
