Throng Sees Body Of "Daddy" Grace

Thousands Present For Bishop's Rites

The last mortal remains of the late "Sweet Daddy" Grace were enroute to New Bedford, Mass., as THE CAROLINIAN went to press Wednesday. Before Bishop Charles Manuel Grace's body is interred, however, he will have been viewed by thousands of followers in Charlotte, N. C., Washington, D. C., Newark, New Jersey and New Bedford.

Elder W. M. Morrison and a delegation attended the rites at Charlotte. Raleigh mourners were bountiful in praise of their deceased bishop.

Singly and in small groups, followers of Bishop Grace visited his church here Monday to pay final tribute to the colorful religious leader. Elder Melvin Adams of Charlotte has been mentioned as a possible successor to the bishop.

There was a steady stream of visitors to the red-white-and-blue brick church during the day but there was nothing resembling the crowd on hand when Grace's body was taken to the church Sunday night.

A crowd estimated by police at up to 15,000 jammed into the

House of Prayer for all People Sunday night to file past the bronze, glass-topped casket containing the body of the 79-year-old evangelist who founded his religious movement here 34 years ago.

The church remained open all night Sunday and some of the mourners were still on hand when the first visitors began arriving at daybreak Monday. The church also re-

"Release Lynch Names," NAACP Urges The FBI

BILOXI, Miss. — Negro leaders called on the FBI last week to announce the names of 23 men, suspected of the lynch-murder of a young Mississippi Negro.

The demands came after a federal grand jury here refused to indict anyone for killing Mack Charles Parker. A state grand jury had refused two months earlier even to study evidence gathered by the FBI after a group of masked and gloved men dragged Parker from the Pearl River County Jail at Poplarville, Miss., and shot him to death.

One-Man Boycott Staged By Cleric

LYNCHBURG, Va.—A one-man boycott of segregation was launched Sunday by the white minister of an integrated church here who resigned last spring as vicar of an all-white church because of his views against segregation.

The Rev. John H. Teeter, 34, pastor of the Good Shepherd Episcopal Church, told his congregation Sunday he will avoid all restaurants, hotels, motels, concerts, theatres and libraries as long as they practice segregation.

"No white man can conceive of the indignities heaped upon Negroes in the south until he makes the attempt to discover them for himself," Rev. Teeter said. "Segregation within and without the church is a denial of the Christian doctrine that all men are of equal value in God's sight, and a denial that Christ died for all men."

Rev. Teeter, a newspaperman for 11 years, resigned last spring

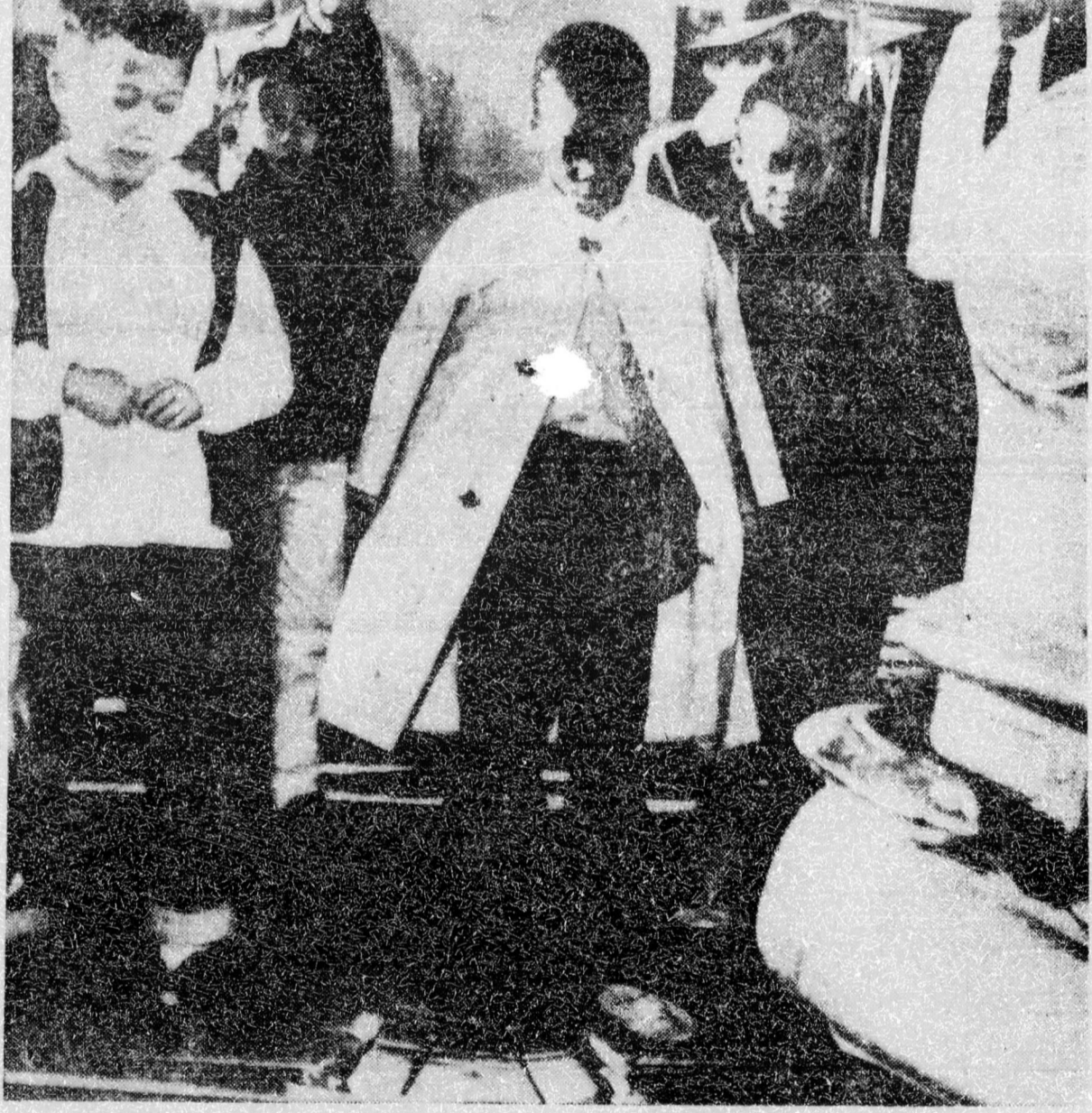
Bullet In Center Of Head Fatal

RICHMOND, Va.—A 15-year-old white boy, arrested here Thursday for painting 28 swastikas on an elementary school, will be tried in

Juvenile Court, authorities said this week.

Juvenile authorities arrested the youth after the symbols, all done neatly in green paint and 18 to 30 inches tall, were found Thursday morning on the sidewalks, doors and walls of the John B. Cary School.

Principal E. C. Beauvais said no threats had been received in the school, located on the edge of a park which separates a white and Negro neighborhood.

Earlier this week police found Nazi symbols painted on the wall of a Jewish Synagogue in Charlottesville, but blotted them out and dismissed the incident as vandalism.
