Officers reported all leads appeared cold this week in a massive manhunt for an escaped convict wanted for the brutal butchering of a prison employee's wife. Charlie Hinton of Wake County was shot last week-end when he was mistaken for the wanted man.

Deputy Sheriff Wiley F. Jones admitted the search for Robert Tyson, 34, of High Point, appears at a dead end. He speculated that the fugitive may have fled to another state but Prisons Director W. F. Bailey said "we have heard nothing to indicate that the man has left this part of the country."

Jones said he based his belief on the fruitlessness of several days of searching for the escaper believed to have knifed to death Mrs. Clyde Earnell Thursday, shortly after walking off the job at the prison meat-slaughtering plant.
