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'Peeping Tom' Victim Of A White Youth

FAVETTEVILLE — A 16-year-old white youth was held under \$5,000 bond Monday pending the outcome of an inquest in the death of a Negro soldier he said he shot when he caught him peeping through a window of his home.

Constantine Masouras told officers Charles Johnson, a soldier stationed at Ft. Bragg, was standing outside the Masouras home early Sunday looking through windows.

Officers quoted the youth as saying he fired a 12-gauge shotgun through a window. The blast struck Johnson, who staggered about two blocks to the home of friends.

He was sent to Womack Army Hospital, but died about five hours after the shooting.

Mayor's Committee Of City In Tenn. Approves Sit-Ins

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. — Sit-in demonstrations at six restaurants were staged by groups of Negroes Saturday with the approval of the Mayor's Committee on Race Relations.

The Negroes were turned away from two of the restaurants, but received service in four others where sit-ins were staged.

The effect of the orderly demonstrations was unclear. One propri-

etor, Mike Cappiello, said he served the Negroes "For the Mayor and his committee," but said he would not do so again until the town was "100 per cent" integrated.

There were no arrests or disorders during the demonstrations. The Mayor's Committee, headed by Dr. William Pollard, a nationally known atomic scientist and Episcopalian clergyman, indicated satisfaction with the effect of the sit-ins. The committee met Saturday to discuss the effect of the demonstrations.

Women's Clubs In Session

Mrs. Gretchen V. C. Abbott, Consultant of Southern States, White House Conference of Children and Youth, Washington, D. C., told a general session of the Federation of Negro Women's Clubs that the recent Golden Anniversary, White House Conference on Children and Youth was a hard working one. It was also the largest number of people to participate in any of the six White House Conferences on Children called by Presidents of the United States since 1909.

She advised the group that the purpose of the Conference was "to promote opportunities for children and youth to realize their full potential for a creative life in freedom and dignity."

The conferees came from all 56 states and the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, Samoa, and from 78 foreign countries. They included representatives from all areas of interest in American life. Mrs. Abbott em-

WINSTON-SALEM — Drinking "canned heat" was blamed Monday in the deaths of three persons here within within four days.

James J. Staples died Sunday night at a local hospital after undergoing treatment for drinking "canned heat." He was admitted Sat., the day that a similar poisoning claimed the life of Eugene Edrington, 36. Officers quoted Edrington as saying he drank with Staples earlier last week.

Mrs. Hattie Burns Young, 34, died Thursday. Acting Forsyth County Coroner B. E. Pulliam said he suspected the woman died from drinking moonshine containing lead salts, but withheld a ruling pending a blood analysis.

Police, however, listed her death as resulting from consuming canned heat.

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FBI Is Barred In State

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A circuit judge barred the U. S. Justice department from inspecting voter registration records in any Alabama county, and Gov. John Patterson hailed the action as "an end to retreating."

Circuit Judge Walter B. Jones issued a temporary injunction shortly after U. S. Attorney General William Rogers asked for access to voter registration records in four southern counties to check for possible discrimination against Negroes.

"I am pleased that Judge Jones has enjoined the federal snoopers from meddling into things here in Alabama that are none of their business," Gov. Patterson said in Mobile. "The time for retreating has come to an end. More power to Judge Jones."

Chief Assistant State Atty. Gen. Nicholas Hare asked for the injunction. Judge Jones set July 7 for a hearing on whether to make the injunction permanent.

The injunction was the second asked for in Alabama in an attack on the nation's new civil rights laws which gave Rogers the power to demand access to voter registration records on grounds of suspected discrimination.

A Selma circuit judge granted a temporary injunction against the Justice Department May 26 when Rogers demanded access to Wilcox County voter registration records, but the Federal Government asked that a hearing on a perma-
