Livingstone Bears Top Friendship

The Livingstone College Bears scored a safety and pushed over a touchdown in the final quarter to defeat the Friendship College Tigers 9-8 in the season's opener here Saturday.

The safety came when Logan, a freshman guard sailed through the line to block a punt which rolled through the end zone. Later, half-back Maurice Wiggins, Rocky Mount junior, scored from the four. The touchdown was set up by a 22 yard run by freshman half-back James Thompson.

Friendship scored its touchdown on a short pass play from quarterback Cornelius Smith to end James Moore, good for three yards and a touchdown. Friendship gambled on a two-point play for the extra point and made it when Williams ran into the end zone.

Livingstone made 12 first downs to 7 for the visitors, and accounted for 200 yards rushing to 153 for Friendship. Friendship showed more accuracy in passing, completing 9 out of 17 attempts, while the Bears could complete only 2 out of 12.

The plans have been completed by the architect and will be given to contractors in the next few days. When the bids are all in, the officials of the college will go over them and the ground will be broken for the beginning of the biggest building program the college has ever projected.
