

Four Youths Must Die For Raping Girl, 17

Six Were Charged In Lane Rape

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—Four of six youths accused of raping a white girl in a secluded "Lover's Lane" were sentenced Friday night to die in the electric chair. An all-male criminal court jury deliberated three hours after a day-long trial. Under Tennessee law a jury may pass sentence. Attorneys for the four youths immediately filed notice of appeal. Two other boys, James Wood, 17, and Freddie Williams, 19, were held separately and will be tried later on the same charge. The victim, a 17-year-old native of Twenty-Nine Palms, Calif., was visiting relatives when the alleged attack occurred. She said she and a male companion had parked in the secluded spot when the youths appeared, forced the couple from the car and took

Food Strike Threatened At College

FAVETTEVILLE — Last Friday morning an eating strike was reportedly being planned at Fayetteville State Teachers College here by the students. It is alleged that the student body was protesting what was described as "insufficient food." Dean Lafayette Parker said last week that he understood there were not as many students eating breakfast as on normal days. He added that he did not have figures from the supervisor at the H. L. Cook Dining Hall as to the actual number eating. Both Dr. Rudolph Jones, president of the college and Dean Parker said Friday morning that they had received no formal complaints from students about food in the dining hall. "There is one menu in the cafeteria," said Dr. Jones. "I eat there quite often and the meals generally are good."

Courtroom Full As Dr. King Sentenced

DECATUR, Ga. — Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., militant integration leader, was ordered Tuesday to serve four months in a Georgia public works camp on a minor traffic violation. Dr. King was among 79 persons arrested October 19 during mass picketing and sit-in demonstrations protesting segregated eating facilities at Atlanta variety and department stores. County officials in this Atlanta suburb called the minister's part in the sit-ins a violation of the 12-month probationary sentence handed him September 23 on a charge of driving without a Georgia license. He was charged with operating a car without a Georgia license, as Georgia drivers' licenses expire April 1. Dr. King said he had a valid Alabama license at the time he was arrested. Judge Oscar Mitchell of DeKalb County Criminal Court heard two hours of argument in a packed courtroom. The court denied bond for Dr. King and set a hearing on an appeal motion for this week. Dr. King, holder of five degrees from colleges and universities, was the leader of the famous Montgomery, Ala. bus boycott and has been active in Southern sit-in demonstrations.

Williams, a well-known golfer in the Raleigh area, has played golf since the age of 12, beginning as a caddy at the Carolina Country Club. He has won many trophies and citations for his ability in golf. He is at present employed by Southern Bell Telephone Company.
