88 Caught In Liquor Raids

Undercover Work Nets NC Arrests

GREENSBORO — Suppliers of poison whiskey were cracked down on Sunday night by federal, state and county agents in a series of bootlegger raids in three counties. Eighty-eight warrants had been issued by early Monday, 36 being in the High Point-Greensboro areas, charging possession and sale of poison liquor. Many persons have died in recent months, reportedly as a result of drinking the whiskey.

Students Stay Home In Protest

DETROIT, Mich. — Again Monday pupils of three Detroit grade schools did not attend classes in protest against the transfer of Negro pupils to their schools. School officials at Guest, Monnier, and Noble grade schools reported that there were no incidents when the Negro pupils entered the schools for the first time, but said the boycott is evident of the disapproval of white parents. Mass absenteeism began Friday.

WILLOW SPRINGS — Bobby Lee Walker, 15, of Willow Springs, Route 1, in Wake County, has been arrested and charged with assaulting Mrs. Lue Winnie Fellows, 45, of near here. Walker is accused of attempting to rape Mrs. Fellows, according to Deputy Sheriff W. L. Pritchett. The woman said she was also forced to kiss the Bible by the youth and swear she would not tell. The officer said he would have to confer with District Solicitor Lester V. Chalmers before determining whether Walker's case will be tried in Wake Superior Court.

County's Teachers Hear Dr. Greene

GARNER — The first meeting of the Wake County Teachers Association was held last week at the Garner Consolidated High School. After the devotional period, the president of the Association, E. L. Sanders, Sr., introduced the speaker, Dr. W. L. Greene. Dr. Greene, executive secretary of the North Carolina Teachers' Association, gave a brief history of the development of the NCTA from the mid-thirties to the present. He also pointed out the importance of the members of the state organization taking part in major decisions which affect each member. Dr. Greene stated that he could only go as far with the organization as the teachers would help him to go. C. J. Barber, principal of Garner Consolidated High School, gave the group a sketch of the testing program currently going on in North Carolina. He pointed out several important facts of which all Negro teachers are becoming aware. The new teachers in Wake County were introduced by Mrs. C. D. Debnam and Mrs. F. H. White, supervisors of the County. Fayetteville Cleric Finally Quits Post

FAYETTEVILLE — Police were called twice last week to the Friendship Baptist Church here in an effort to stop two brawls, one of which was a free-for-all involving the entire congregation. Legal action came when the trustees asked that the preacher, Rev. J. W. Simpson, be restrained from using the pulpit. The trustees claim that on Oct. 17 Rev. Simpson resigned, but has refused to leave. The trustees, too, complained that "the pastor engages in loud and profane conduct while on the church premises and he did engage in physical combat with other ministers and members of the church." They have obtained a temporary injunction. A show-cause hearing was scheduled for Monday before Superior Court Judge William Y. Bickett, but attorneys for both sides in the squabble report that an agreement has been reached; the minister will resign. The hearing has been canceled. T. Marshall May defend Dr. M. L. King. ATLANTA, Ga. — The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who was granted bail and freed this week from confinement in Reidsville State Prison, will have the assistance of NAACP attorneys on the appeal of his case. D. L. Hollowell, Atlanta attorney who is in charge of the case in which Dr. King was ordered to serve four months of a probationary sentence for failure to possess a Georgia driving license, is a veteran of NAACP legal battles in this state. On the appeal he will have the active assistance of Thurgood Marshall of New York and of George N. Leighton of the Chicago law firm of McCoy, Ming and Leighton. Some years ago Mr. Leighton was president of NAACP.
