## Ten-Vote Margin Supports Segregation At Assembly

North Carolina's Student Legislature convened in Raleigh last week. The three-day session began Thursday and ended Saturday with the defeat of a bill calling for an end to racial segregation in the state. It was introduced by the delegation of Livingstone College, Salisbury.

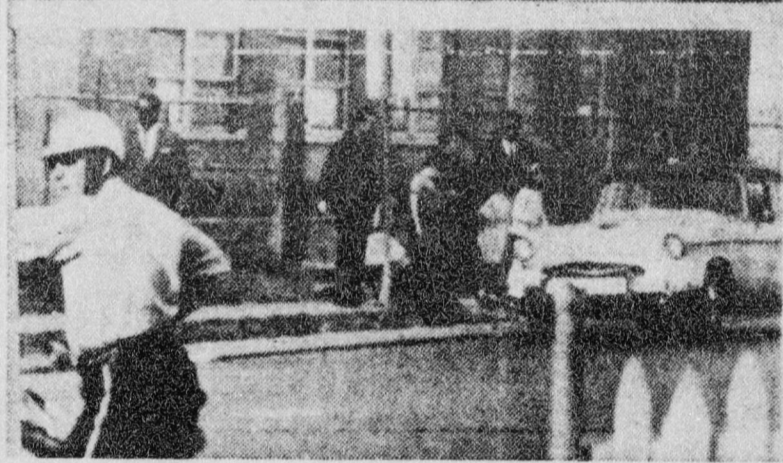
Nabbed by agents were Aaron Fine, 45, of Savannah Beach, and Joseph T. Addison, Sr., 46, of Savannah.

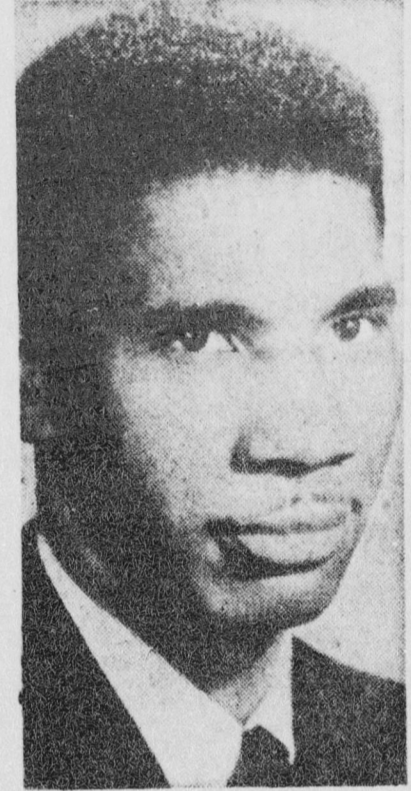
## WEATHER
