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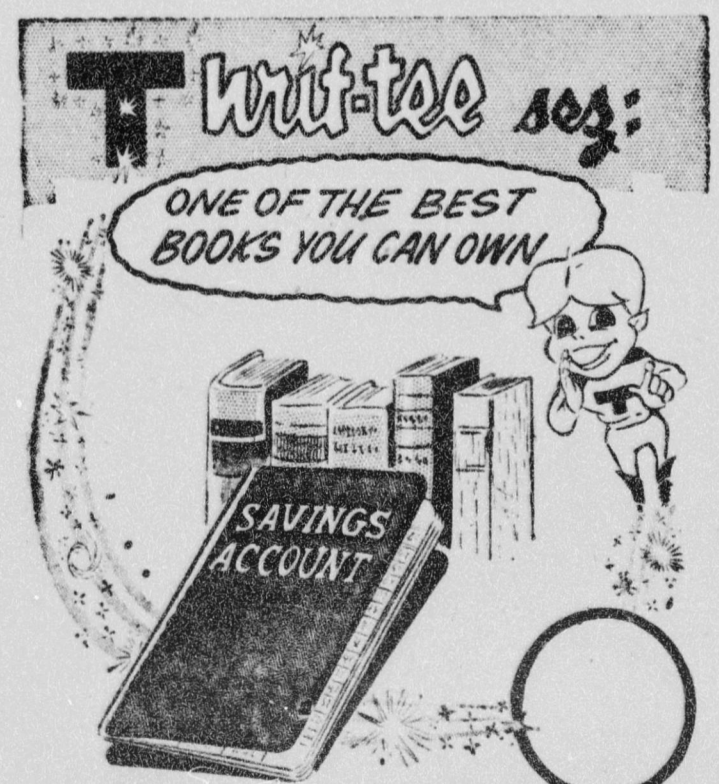
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In New Orleans:

Deltas To Sponsor A Yule Party

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The "New Orleans Four", the six year old girls being integrated in the first grade of two New Orleans schools will be guests of honor at a Delta Sigma Theta Christmas party in New Orleans, Sunday, December 18, according to Dr. Jeanne L. Noble, Delta National President.

Each Negro elementary school in New Orleans has been asked to send one first grade student to the party, which will be attended, by an expected 300 students, their families, friends and distinguished citizens of New Orleans.

Santa Claus will distribute gifts to all of the children under a gaily decorated Xmas tree, and a high school band has agreed to provide musical entertainment. Some entertainers will also perform.

Delta Sigma Theta national officers and alumnae and graduate chapters will contribute gifts for the six-year olds.

Monies left over from the party will go into a Fund to insure a gift filled Xmas for the families of the "New Orleans Four", should they face economic reprisal. (One of the girls' father has already lost his job because of the integration move.)

This is the fourth such Xmas party Delta Sigma Theta has sponsored, with the support of its membership. Delta has a membership of 28,000 in 267 chapters in 40 states, the District of Columbia, and foreign chapters in Haiti and Liberia.

In 1957, the Delta party was for the "Little Rock Nine" in 1958, for the Chania Medical Center in Fanya, East Africa, and in 1959, for "The Lost Class of Prince Edward County", Virginia.

SCLC Unit To 'March' In Virginia

PETERSBURG, Va.—The newly organized Virginia Christian Leadership Conference, headed by Dr. Milton A. Reid, announced today the third annual Pilgrimage of Prayer For Public Schools, set for January 2, 1961 at Farmville, Va. This year, the site of the non-violent mass protest will be the infamous and school-less Prince Edward County.

"We feel the need," declared the militant Petersburg pastor, "to go to Prince Edward itself. Despite the legal battle that is being waged by the NAACP and the interim program of the Prince Edward County Association, the Federal Government seems not to have taken any note that this is the only school district in America without public education."

This is the second school year that the county has been without any public school facilities. Most of the Negro children participate in the volunteer educational centers throughout the country and some few others have been enrolled in schools outside the state. The white children have been attending a makeshift private school set-up supported by a segregationist foundation.

The Rev. L. Francis Griffin, peerless leader of the embattled Negro community said of the pilgrimage, "sometimes we get the feeling that the rest of the nation has forgotten us. Perhaps this pilgrimage will help some people a-

Scholarly Coed Hangs Self In Cousin's Dining Room

PHILADELPHIA (ANP)—"I am to blame for the reasons I want to die."

This short, vague and yet tragic note was the only message allegedly left by scholarly Nancy Logan, 22, of Washington, D. C., who was studying for a master's degree in physics at the University of Pennsylvania.

Her body last week was found hanging from a rope in the dining room of the home where she lived with her cousin, Mrs. Lora Woods, 47. The co-ed's limp form was found dangling above the dining

room table by Mrs. Woods when she returned home from work.

Miss Logan's body was still clad in pajamas and a housecoat and her hair in curlers. The cousin said that is how Miss Logan was dressed when they said goodbye on the morn-

ing of the tragedy. The victim's father, Lewis Logan, of Washington, D. C., claimed the body last week at the Medical Examiner's Office.

Miss Logan was a graduate of Spingarn High school and Howard university where she majored in

physics. At Howard she was president of the German Club, and was on the dean's honor roll.

She graduated with honors last June. She has a Phi Beta Kappa key and was elected to membership in Pi Mu Kappa, Sigma Pi Sigma and Beta Kappa Chi, all honorary societies.

She was also a research fellow of the National Science Foundation and a member of First Baptist Church where she served as clerk and adviser of the Junior Church, and was an educational board member.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Logan; a sister, Mrs. Omega Silva; and two brothers, Garland and Kenzel Logan, all of Washington.
