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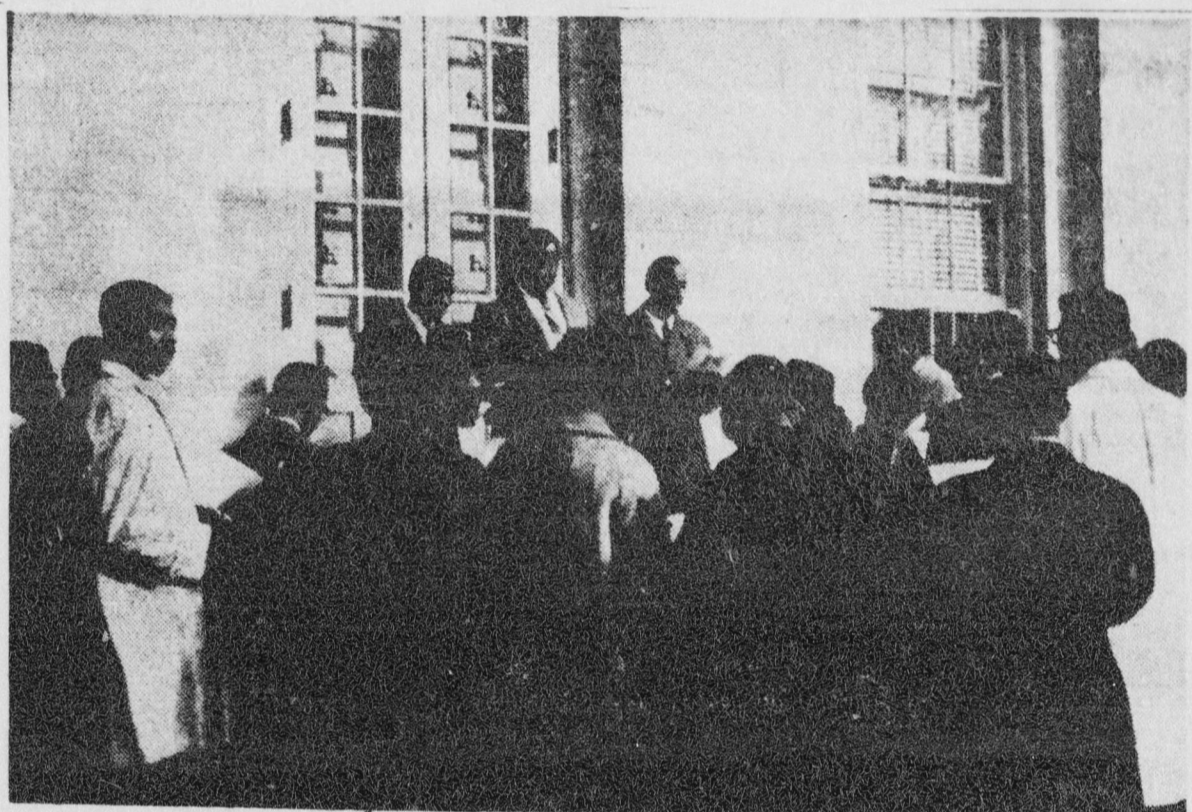

Change In Employment Rules Asked

A committee composed of four Raleigh persons has had little success in attempts to work out negotiations with managers of chain food stores concerning the hiring of Negroes in all areas of employment other than just janitorial. A buying boycott has been threatened unless this is achieved.

Ralph Campbell, Sr., local NAACP president, reported this week on the activities of the Employment Committee of the NAACP and the Raleigh Citizens Association.

Attempt To Worship Thwarted By Ushers

A Shaw University student told this reporter Tuesday how he and a companion were ejected from the Calvary Baptist Church (white) by ushers here Sunday morning, following a pilgrimage by Shaw and St. Augustine's College students which began on the steps of the State Capitol with 40 persons participating.

James Dew, a sophomore from Washington, D. C., also related the manner in which a worshipper at the same church threatened to run the two students down with his truck if he ever encountered them on the street. Bruce Eure was the other student. This worshipper is said to have had a Bible under his arm at the time the threat was made. The church, located at the corner of Fayetteville and South Streets, is just across the street from the site of North Carolina's new Governor, Terry Sanford's inauguration only three days before (Thursday). These were the only unfavorable incidents taking place, it was reported.

Dew said, "Although they threw me out of the church last Sunday, I will return there this Sunday." About 40 persons, including non-students, took part in the 30-minute service at the Capitol about 10 a. m. Sunday.

The Rev. James S. Williams, president of Shaw's NAACP chapter, was the leader of the ceremonies. He preached a

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University Of Georgia Admits Two Undergrads

ATHENS, Ga. — Two Negro students entered the University of Georgia Tuesday and became the first to attend integrated classes in the 175-year history of the institution. They also became the first Negroes to attend "mixed" public schools in Georgia's history.

Although there was some jeering, no acts of violence were reported.

Miss Charlayne A. Hunter, 18, and Hamilton E. Holmes, 19,

paid their tuition fees and prepared for their first classes after a federal judge restrained the state from closing the university and the Supreme Court refused to grant a delay in the integration order.

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Roy Wilkins Confers With John F. Kennedy

NEW YORK, N. Y. — Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and recognized as one of America's most influential men, conferred with President-elect John Fitzgerald Kennedy Friday.

Mr. Wilkins said this includes a pledge to change the Senate rules to make it easier to shut off filibuster against rights legislation.

Afterward he said that he is satisfied the incoming chief executive will support all of the Democratic platform pledges on civil rights

Wilkins and Kennedy spent almost one hour together. "I just wanted to talk about civil rights," the NAACP chief told newsmen.
