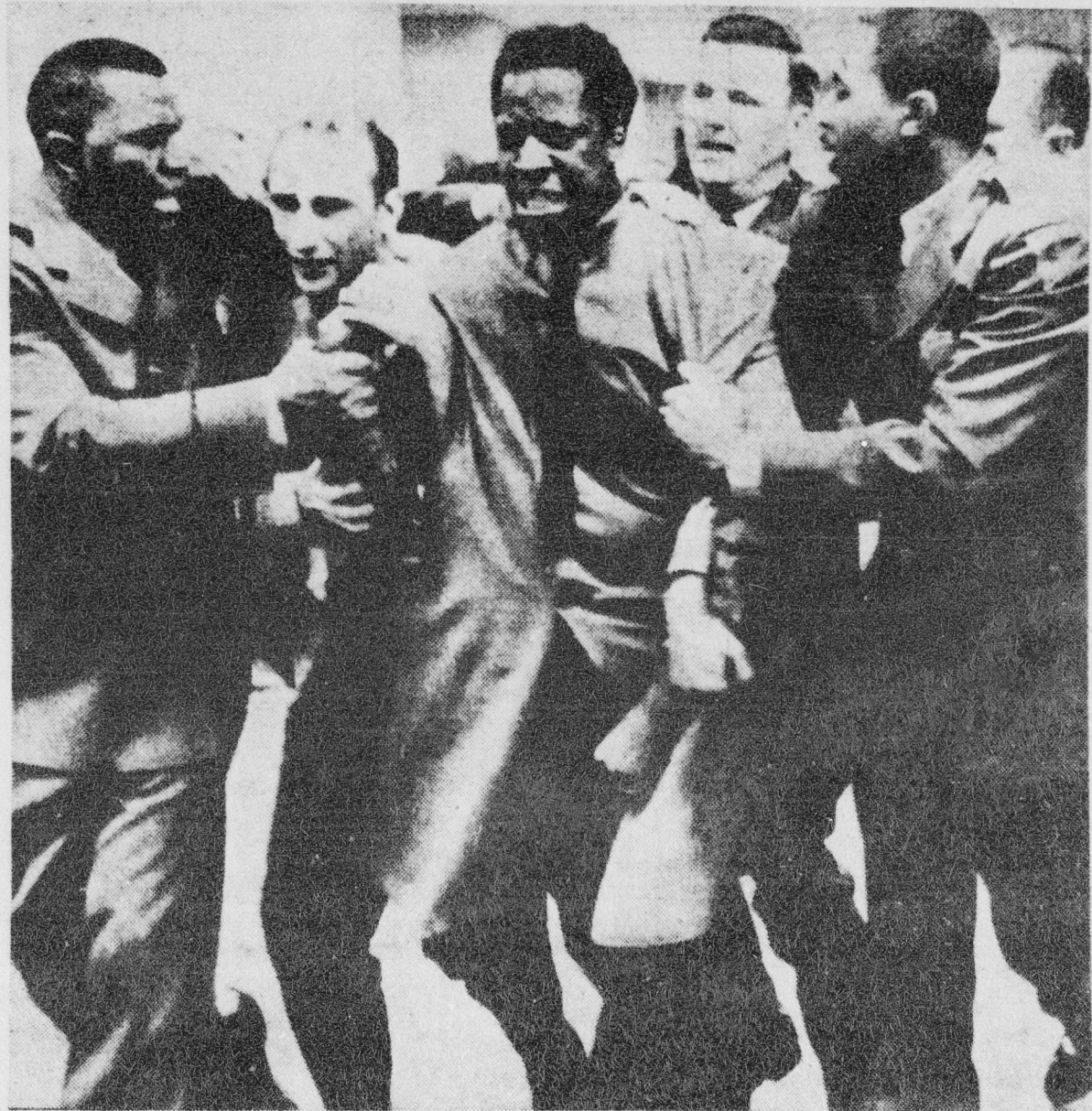


# Man Held As Poison 'Booze' Seller

### Winston-Salem Resident To Face Judge In Whiskey Case

WINSTON-SALEM — Milton Davis, Jr., of Winston-Salem, believed to be the seller of the white whiskey drunk the day before by a prisoner that died on his way to a Central Prison unit has been picked up, according to the Prisons Department.

He complained of being sick and said he had been drinking liquor prior to his conviction. He was treated by a doctor, who ordered Perkins to a prison hospital. He died just before reaching the prison.

Davis was identified by Lawling as the seller of the whiskey Perkins drank, according to the Prisons Department.

FRAUD AT CITY HALL: If a recent news item in one of this city's dailies is true, one of the cheapest frauds ever conceived is being carried out at the new city hall.

Some time ago the Raleigh Citizens Association made inquiries at City Hall regarding segregated rest rooms. The Negro delegation was assured that proper steps would be taken to eliminate this illegal practice. The delegation was assured that no discriminatory markings would be used in the designation of rest room facilities.

According to the news item already referred to, the promise to avoid any racial designations on the doors of the rest rooms at city hall has been kept. The doors of the public rest rooms are simply marked M and W and a room number.

The employees on the second floor where the public rest rooms are all located have allegedly been instructed to refer all Negroes to a certain numbered rest room and

KINSTON—Winston Phillips, a Durham resident charged with the murder of a Kinston school teacher, was released from jail Friday under a bond of \$25,000.

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### Taken Out Of Solitary Confinement

ROCK HILL, S. C.—Eight sit-in demonstrators, released from solitary confinement late Monday, returned to their work details Tuesday at the York County Prison Camp.

York County supervisor, J. Ed Allen, reported that the eight called for him and Prison Superintendent Charles C. Maloney late Monday and said they were ready to return to work. He said all eight were then released from solitary confinement and were back at assigned jobs.

They were among 13 demonstrators who chose to go to jail rather than post bail following conviction in anti-segregation suits. The prisoners refused to work reportedly and were placed in solitary confinement last Friday. They received their first full meal Monday after two days of bread and water. The disciplinary action was the second taken against the sit-inners, said Maloney.

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### Person Is "County Of The Year"

GREENSBORO—Person County has been named winner of the 1960 North Carolina "County of the Year" award for rural progress.

The award is given annually to the county in which the Negro population has in the past year contributed the most impressive gains to the overall development of the county. With the honor goes the William Poe Memorial Cup, named in honor of the late editor of the Progressive Farmer, the Raleigh publication.

The announcement was made late Saturday by Dr. William E. Reed, chairman of the Rural Progress Committee and dean of the School of Agriculture at A&T College. A&T College sponsors the project.

Person County won out in eliminations over three other North Carolina counties which placed in the following order: Orange, Duplin and Bertie. A total of 71 counties participated in the campaign.

The decision was reached following a tabulation of ballots cast by members of the Committee who visited each of the finalist counties for examination of statistical reports and on-the-spot observations.

The winning county, in the unanimous opinion of the judges "had demonstrated the most impressive
