

### Taken Out Of Solitary Confinement

ROCK HILL, S. C. - Eight sitin demonstrators, released from solitary confinement late Monday. returned to their work details Tuesday at the York County Prison Camp.

York County supervisor, Ed Allen, reported that the eight called for him and Prison Superintendent Charles C. Maloney late Monday and said thew were ready to return to work. He said all eight were then released from solitary confinement and were back at assigned jobs.

They were among 13 demonstrators who chose to go to jail rather than post bail following conviction in anti-segregations. The prisoners refused to work reportedly and were placed in solitary confinement last Friday. They received their first full meal Monday after two days of bread and water. The disciplinary action was the second taken against the sit-inners, said Maloney
