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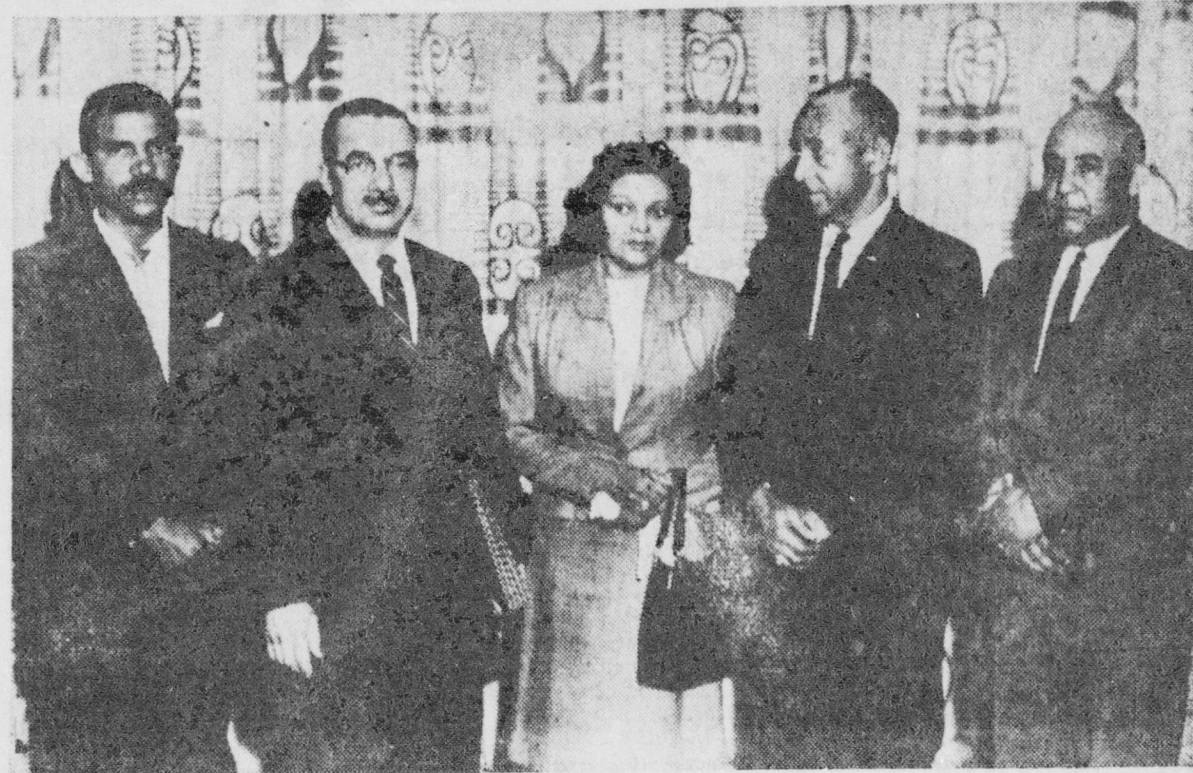
H. V. Brown Seeks Post As Alderman

GOLDSBORO — Hugh Victor Brown, retired principal of Dillard High School here, paid his filing fee Monday as a candidate for the Goldsboro Board of Aldermen.

Mr. Brown thus became the second member of his race ever to make a bid for this city post. Dr. M. E. DuEissette was unsuccessful in the 1953 and 1955 elections. The candidate made it clear that he was not running on a "Negro ticket," but said: "I'm running on a platform of a fair share of responsibility of serving the public." He pointed out that if he was elected his position would not be one of radicalism.

Brown is well-known in educational circles in North Carolina.

Another delegate appointed by the president for a UN post was Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who has served in a similar capacity in the past and has also been a member of the

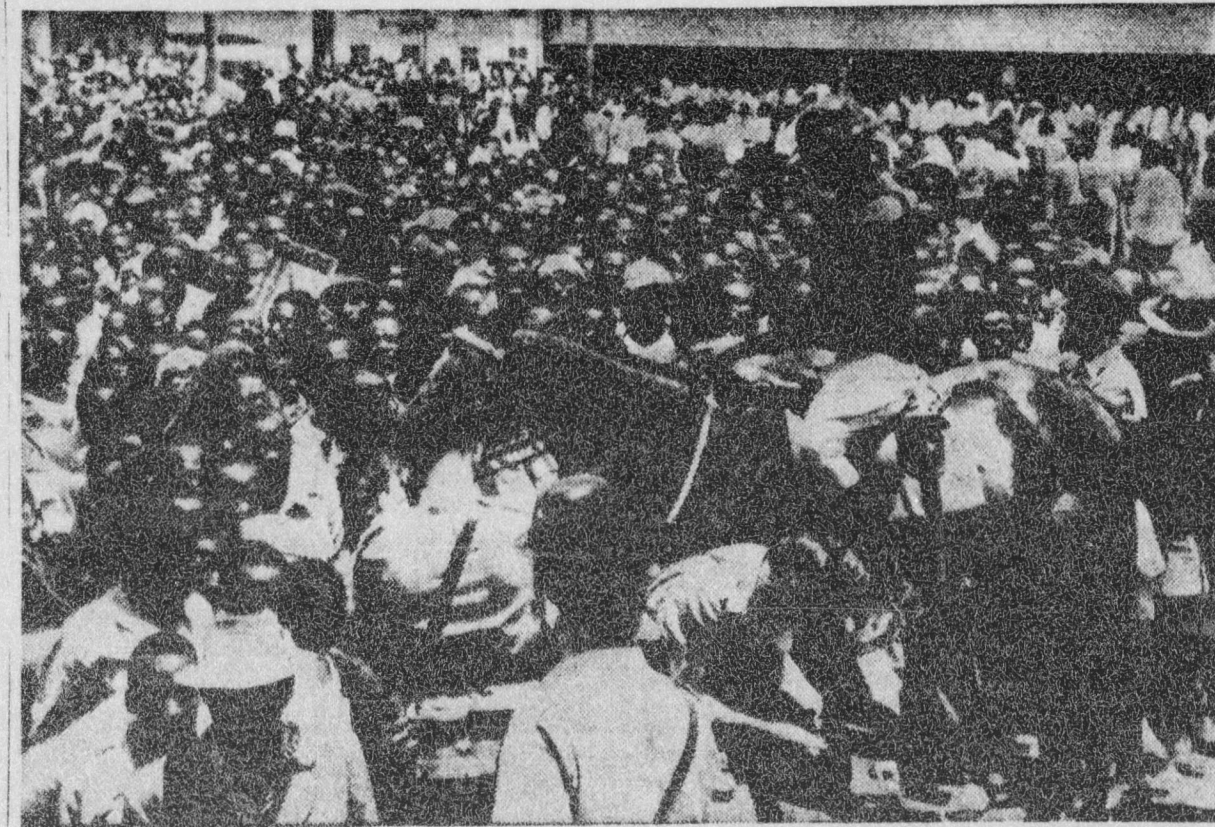
U. N. Commission on Human Rights.

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Man, Son On Trial In Slaying

TARBORO — Trial started here Monday in the case of Oswald Hyman, white farm operator, and his 18-year-old son, Richard, charged with the rifle slaying of Jesse Malone, 16-year-old Negro tenant farmer.

The shooting occurred January 8 on the farm of B. C. Mayo, about five miles from Tarboro, when Malone was killed by a hail of .22 caliber rifle bullets, fired by Richard Hyman. The youth was struck eight times and Dr. J. G. Raby, county coroner, said any one of four of the wounds could have been fatal.
