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Hospital Jobs Are Discussed

The Raleigh Citizens Association last week, through a committee, announced it will seek fair employment for Negroes on the staff of the new Wake Memorial Hospital.

A local official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Ralph Campbell, president, indicated the group is concerned primarily with members of the staff at St. Agnes Hospital, which will close with the opening of Wake Memorial Hospital in April.

The NAACP official also charged that when members of the staff at St. Agnes applied for employment with the new facility, they were told that they could not fill the same types of office jobs which they held at St. Agnes, but that other jobs were available in the field areas which would be in night work.

The administrator of St. Agnes, Ralph C. Bartlett, said the hospital employs about 100 persons, over half of them being nurses, nurses' aides and orderlies. Others are office personnel and maintenance workers.
