

Fight Breaks Up Talks:

Violence Mars Baptist Meeting

Minister Accuses Man, 72

NEW YORK (AP) — Bitterness between followers of Dr. J. H. Jackson of Chicago and Dr. Gardner C. Taylor of Brooklyn, leaders of rival factions of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., resulted in violence at the Baptist Ministers Conference here last week.

"HE COULDN'T TAKE IT" "I beat him in a debate and he couldn't take it!" This was the way Rev. James R. Moore, for more than 30 years the pastor of Amity Baptist Church, Jamaica, Queens, explained why he ended up on the floor during the meeting.

Despite this, Rev. Moore said that he holds no bitterness against his reported assailant, 72-year-old Rev. Thomas Harten, vice-president of the Convention. According to many of the more than 150 ministers who were present in the auditorium Rev. Moore, a former president of the New York Ministers' conference, was speaking and urging the two rival factions in the local Baptists to get together and stop feuding.

Rev. Harten, however, reportedly accused Moore of being one of those responsible for the split

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Teachers End 80th Convention

The 4,500 delegates to the 80th session of the North Carolina Teachers Association were given a challenge by Dr. J. M. Nabrit, president of Howard University, Washington, D. C., Friday night when he told them that they had a big obligation to strengthen the ties of American democracy.

The school head pointed to the fact that the signs, coming out of Washington, recognizing the ability of Negroes to do a job, in any field of endeavor were encouraging, but he warned that the Negro must re-evaluate himself and this can only be done by a closer look on the part of his teachers.

Dr. Nabrit has an enviable record as a civil rights leader and he attempted to pass some of his experiences on to the audience. He told the delegates that no time was ever more appropriate than now for the teachers of the state to pick up the cudgel and march toward the utopia of first-class citizenship for all persons.

The U. S. Supreme Court's 1954 decision ordered the states to proceed with deliberate speed . . . North Carolina under its governors had certainly avoided the mistakes of other States. It has attempted to do something . . .

"But six years after this decision only 22 students have been integrated in North Carolina and only one in Raleigh . . ."

"Do not be deceived. This is not integration," he said. "You're not getting equal education." This remark drew loud applause. . . . Negroes in North Carolina have not made enough applications to transfer to white schools

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Dr. Graham Talks On Youth Move

ROCK HILL, S. C. — Dr. Frank Porter Graham, former president of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, speaking here Tuesday in a city long known as a focal point of racial sit-in protests, declared:

"The Southern youth movement in the lawful petitions for the same service for the same price did not have its democratic origin in Moscow, but in Carpenter's Hall, Philadelphia, on the Fourth of July, 1776. Its farther headquarters are in the Judean Hills where the Carpenter's Son taught and died for the equal freedom and dignity of all peoples as children of one God and brothers of all people."

FAYETTEVILLE — Mrs. Freda Mae Coley, 25, who was convicted in Federal Court here last week of kicking her 22-month-old daughter to death in the living room of their Pt. Bragg home, received a 12-year sentence Friday from Judge Algebon Butler.

The jury deliberating the case, after listening to Army and FBI investigators, stayed out less than half an hour before returning the verdict of guilty of second degree murder.

The sentencing was one of the final actions of a one-week term of court.

Weaver, whose appointment by President Kennedy touched off a heated row in the Senate, told the magazine:
