



Jackson police identified the four as George Anne Washington, 20, of Jackson; Doris Ruth Bracey, 19, of Raymond; and Walter H. Jones, 18, of Forest, students at Jackson State College; and John-ny Barbour, Jr., 21, of Greenwood, a student at Campbell College here.

Chief of detectives M. B. Pierce said the students were released on \$500 bond each. Bonds were posted by Dr. W. E. Miller and Cornelius Turner, both Negroes.

The two men and two coeds boarded a city bus on Capital St. in the main part of downtown Jackson. They said later they planned to ride to the Municipal Park Zco.




