Man Claims Wife Offered To Pay For Death Ride NAACP Begins N. C. Attack



Find Body Floating In Stream

WENDELL — A Wake County husband who claims his wife offered to pay him to take her to a river bridge so she could commit suicide is being held in the Wake County Jail at Raleigh without bond.

Deputy Sheriff C. C. Doan said he was holding Robert Adams, 32-year-old man, on suspicion of murder after his wife, Mrs. Lucille Adams, was found drowned Sunday morning in Little River.

The body was discovered by fishermen, floating in a stream about 1 1/2 miles south of U. S. Highway 84 crossing of the river and near

Medic's Term Upheld

Tribunal Rules On Dr. Bass

The State Supreme Court last week ruled against a physician who was convicted of degrading the left hand of a man who sought to collect insurance money by removing four fingers.

The case involved Dr. Irvin K. Bass, who received a six-month suspended sentence on charges of being an accessory before the fact of felonious maiming.

The high court's opinion, written by Associate Justice Clifton Moore, went into a long review of common law relating to maiming.

Evidence showed the doctor had applied a local anesthetic to the left hand of Walter Rogers, Burlington native, who reportedly permitted a friend to cut off four of his fingers with an electric power saw.

Former Charlotte Cleric To Be Extradited From N. Y.

ALBANY N. Y. — New York's Governor Nelson Rockefeller refused Saturday to intervene in the extradition of the Rev. Walter M. Cavers, 51, a South Carolina minister, who is being sought to serve a jail term of 18 months for a traffic death in the Pametto State.

The governor said, however, he had tried to get South Carolina Gov. Ernest F. Hollings to allow parole in New York State for Rev. Cavers, but the governor refused.

Rev. Cavers, who formerly lived in Charlotte, N. C., after serving parolates in South Carolina, received the term in a 1958 collision

Jim Crow Colleges 'Burden:' Ribicoff

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A conference of southern educators was held here last week that segregated colleges represent a financial burden "the south can ill afford to continue." The major highlight of the convention was that costly and unnecessary duplication facilities be eliminated.

The speaker was Secretary of Welfare Abraham Ribicoff.

"The level of education of white students has been lowered and the level of education of Negroes has suffered," said Ribicoff. "Many of the separate educational facilities have never been equal in quality."

Secretary Ribicoff spoke at a conference, conducted for two days, on goals for higher education in

the south, sponsored by the Southern Regional Education Board.

Most of those in attendance were presidents of southern colleges and universities.

Ribicoff said: "The problems of higher education are legion and in the southern region these have been multiplied.
