PHILADELPHIA (ANP) - For the second time within two years. Samuel Shepard last week walked out of court a free man after being accused of rape when a 25 year old professional dancer who said he attacked and raped her in an automobile refused to testify. Shepard, 34-year-old mar-

ried son of Rev. Marshall Shepard, nationally known minister and member of the city council, escaped prosecution on a similar charge in July 1959.
