

#### 6 Arrested

Six Negroes have been arrested and released on bonds of \$100 each in Columbus, Ga., for failing to move to the rear of a city bus. The arrests came Monday when a Negro leader was told by the city commission that his request that the city voluntarily end segregation in buses was "still under study."
