PHILADELPHIA (ANP)—Dr. J. H. Jackson, one of two claimants to the presidency of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., has been defendant in a \$750,000 suit.

The minister, who is pastor of Olivet Baptist Church, Chicago, is being sued as owner of a tenement here where two little girls developed lead poisoning allegedly as the result of eating plaster which had fallen from the ceiling of several rooms.

The suit was filed recently in the U. S. District Court by Artis Myrick, 43 complainants in the case are his two daughters, Debra, 4, and Loretta, 3. Their attorneys

The jury, headed by Coroner J. R. Long, ordered Huston Duncan, 18, of Warrenton, held without bond. Long said Duncan admitted stabbing Robert Freeman twice with a pocket knife.

Bond of \$2,000 each was set for David Martin, 18, Olin Ward, 18, and Edward Gause, 17, all of Hallsville. The Martin youth was the only one to post bond. The others were jailed.

According to newspaper reports, Mr. Craven is alleged to have "cursed out" the local unemployed Negro workers because he was not speedily successful.

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## 2 Schools To Receive Students

Eight Negro students will attend two previously all-white schools here when the doors open in September. All were re-assigned without making applications.

This decision was made Tuesday afternoon by the Raleigh School Board, following a plea by Attorney Fred J. Carnage, the only Negro member of the Board.

The application of Miss Rose Marie Ellis, 705 E. Edenton St., who had asked to be admitted to Needham Broughton was denied. She, along with her parents, appeared at the Tuesday session.

J. C. Washington, stepfather of Miss Ellis, told the board that he sought transfer of his daughter because Broughton is a senior high school, offering more courses in commercial education than Ligon-Jr.-Sr. High School.

The Board ruled, however, that since Miss Ellis' home was located nearer to Ligon and the business administration department there is accredited, she should return to Ligon. Names of those reassigned are:

## Dr. S. E. Duncan Speaks At Michigan AMEZ Meet

DETROIT, Mich.—Dr. S. E. Duncan, president of Livingstone College, Salisbury, capstone of education for the AME Zion Church, embarked on a new approach to Christian address at the Connec-tional Council of the denomination, Thursday night. Bishop H. B. Shaw of the 3rd Episcopal District, opened the meetings.

The college proxy said that the activities of the Freedom Riders had made it necessary for the church-related schools and seminaries to take a new look at their curriculum, with

an eye toward training Christian leaders in the fine art of non-violent effort so as to make their work more effective and more productive.

He said that it is not enough for Christian leaders to point the way to true leadership, prompted by a desire to free underprivileged people, but they were going to have to lead the way.

He berated the fact that not enough people were inclined to abstain the proper education to make them true Christian leaders. He pointed out that a real job of recruiting had to be done and related three groups that offered a

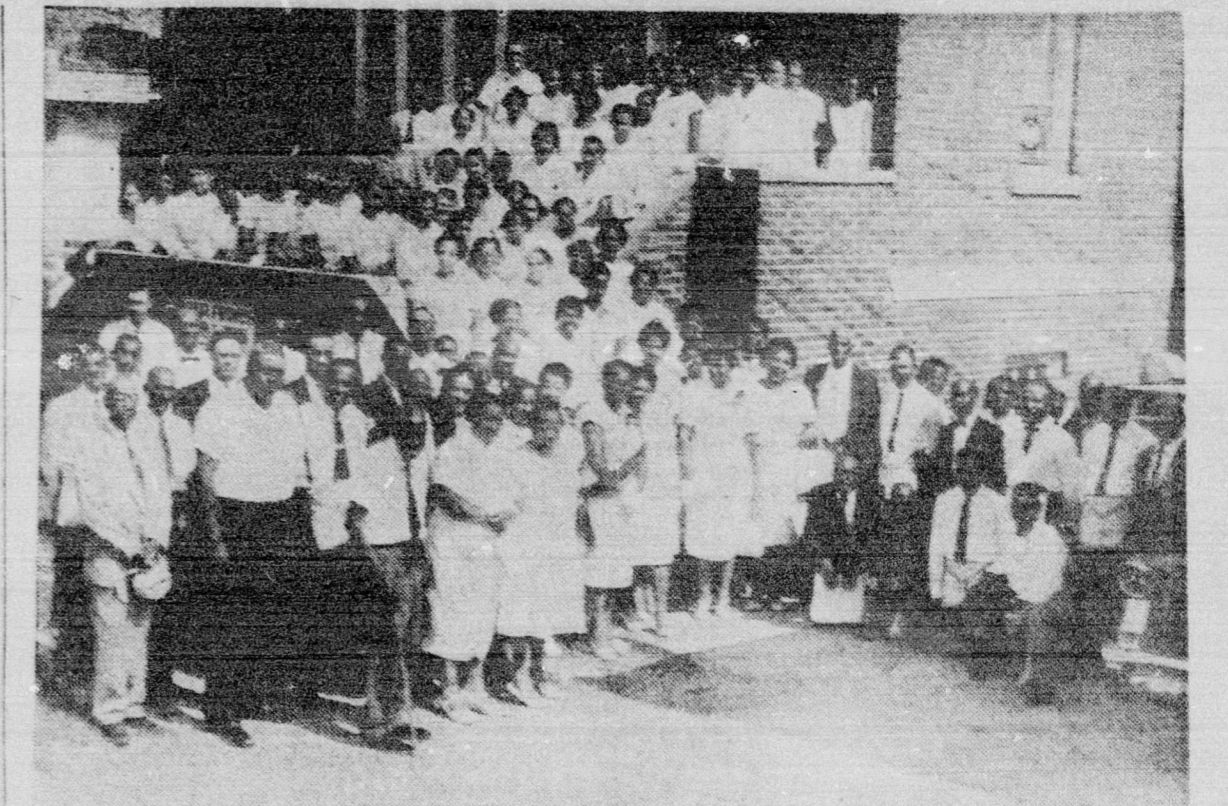
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## State News Brief

## Robert Williams Claims Shots Were Fired At His Home Sunday

MONROE—Robert F. Williams, NAACP leader in Union County, reported to police Sunday that several cars passed his home early last morning and fired shots.

Williams, who last week was reported in The CAROLINIAN as collecting guns and looking forward to receiving gas masks and ammunition, was once sus-

pended by The NAACP for advocating "meeting violence with violence."

He said the gunfire was returned by some men in his home Sunday morning.

The incident, according to Williams, has been reported to the FBI.

Donald Roney, agent of the Charlotte office of the FBI, reported that he received no such report from Williams.



## Laborers Target Of Criticism

Lee J. Craven, manager of the Raleigh employment office, threatened Friday to start cracking down on job benefit claimants because his call for 40 non-skilled laborers had been answered by only 13 applicants.

The manager said that for two days his office had advertised through radio stations and the newspapers for the workers and received "very little response."

Craven said, "I'm going to start cracking down on these people who don't want to work when we can get them a job."

He added that over 75 Negro benefit claimants in the employment office are listed as unskilled.

Construction work is the job openings waiting for such workers, said Craven.
