

CHAPEL HILL-Negro workers are turning away from the unions in seeking job opportunities, according to an official of the AFL-

CIO, who spoke here last Friday. Franz E. Daniel, assistant director of organization for the group, told the Tri-State Labor School that Negro workers were defeating in elections where they used to support annexation.

"The Negro used to vote for us 90 per cent in company elections. Daniel said. Now we are losing elections because of them. Speaking on 'Southern Labor Problems," he said the civil rights issue can be used among the tan ions of both Negro and white work-
