Judge Asks For Three Crusades

NEW YORK CITY—In a pre-convention press conference Judge Hobson R. Reynolds, of Philadelphia, Grand Exalted Ruler of the Improved Benevolent Protective Order of Elks of the World (I.B.P.E.W.) called for "three great crusades" by the United States to maintain world leadership during 1951.

The International Elks leader asserted that the U. S. must show a determined effort to aid Latin America, take a position of firmness in face of Nikita Khrushchev's aim to win the world for Communism and eliminate discrimination at home to give renewed encouragement to the new nations of Africa to follow American World leadership.

The I.B.P.E.W. which Judge Reynolds heads has an estimated international membership of 450,000 and nearly 3,000 small lodges and temples. The Elks opened their 82nd Annual Grand Lodge Convention here last weekend, with continuing sessions until Aug. 25th at the Commodore Hotel.
