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N. C. Farm Agent Fired

Commissioners Relieve Boodie Of Duties In Pitt

GREENVILLE—James M. Boodie, farm agent of Pitt County, has been fired by the county commissioners and the home demonstration agent has been suspended.

Action made by the commissioners followed a recommendation by H. M. McNeil, district agricultural agent.

Boodie was dismissed because of "his failure to maintain the high standards required in fulfilling his job and example as outlined and implied in the discretion of his job."

Mrs. Amelia Capehart, home agent was suspended, subject to further investigation into the operation of the farm program in Pitt County.

This action by the commissioners now leaves the county farm agent's office with only one agent.

A third person, Mrs. Grace Cheek, the assistant home economics agent, submitted her resignation Tuesday to take a position in Richmond County.

Rev. DeBerry, Ex-Raleigh Pastor, Here

A native of Mt. Gilead, the Rev. Mr. DeBerry was graduated from the theological department of Talladega College, in Talladega, Alabama and came to Raleigh in 1911 from Kings Mountain where he had been serving as chaplain of the Lincoln Academy.

Minister Suffers Fracture Of Skull, Dies As Baptists Meet

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (ANP)—Dr. Joseph H. Jackson of Chicago, following an all-night election here, was returned to the office of president of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. But the religious body's 8th Annual Session was marred by the death of a Detroit minister who suffered a head injury during a riot involving supporters of Jackson and the Rev. Gardner C. Taylor of New York.

The Rev. Arthur Garfield Wright, 64, died 7 hours after he suffered a skull fracture when he was pushed or fell from the platform, in what was later termed an accident. Rev. Wright, also a prominent business man in Detroit, plunged five feet from the podium to the floor, landing on his head. He remained in a coma and died after doctors at Memorial Medical center performed emergency surgery in an effort to repair brain damage.

PROMINENT IN DETROIT The Rev. Mr. Wright, pastor of Mt. Harmony Baptist Church, was reputedly the second richest Negro in Detroit.

He owned a mortuary, and an insurance and loan firm bearing his name. Highly active in church youth work, the Rev. Mr. Wright is survived by his widow and a daughter.

ELECTION DELAYED

The election, observed across the nation because of the year-long dispute between Jackson and Taylor over the title of presidency, was delayed for several hours by the credentials committee. Dr. D. A. Holmes, pastor of Paseo Baptist Church here, was appointed election monitor by the Jackson county court.

Starting Thursday night, the election ended Friday at 4:30 a.m., with Jackson receiving 2,732 votes to

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Integration Proceeds Peacefully In Raleigh Schools, Throughout South

Integration of three local high schools went off without incident as Raleigh's 25 schools opened last Wednesday.

Five Negroes were enrolled at Daniels Junior High, three at Broughton Senior High and one at Murphy Elementary School. A second Negro child assigned to Murphy — Miss Carolyn Washington, did not enroll. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Washington of 705 E. Edenton Street.

At Chapel Hill, 34 Negro youngsters are attending predominantly white schools as a result of a new policy assigning first graders strictly on the basis of geography.

Under the plan, 26 first-graders are attending Carboro School, Esplanade Elementary School and Glenwood School.

Thirteen Negro boys and girls in Grades 4-8 are attending the previously all-white St. Anthony's Catholic School at Southern Pines

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and Sister Catherine Leonard, principal, reported that "things are working out just fine." The children formerly attended Our Lady of Victory, a small mission school in a Negro neighborhood.

Urban League Conference Held In Ohio

DAYTON, Ohio—A need to recognize that the Urban League as a movement is "at war" against prejudice discrimination was voiced at the close of the National Urban League Conference by Whitney M. Young, Jr., executive director-elect of the organization, last week.

Mr. Young, who on Oct. 1 will succeed Lester B. Granger in the post the latter has held for twenty years, spoke at the annual banquet of the 161 NUL Conference. He addressed a crowd of more than 500 that overflowed the facilities of the banquet hall. More than 100 persons jammed the adjacent corridors to listen to the banquet speakers—Mr. Young, George L. P. 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Defendant Sentenced In Burning

Included among the cases disposed of in the Wake Superior Court last week was one involving a man sentenced for burning a barn.

Judge C. W. Hall is presiding over the current term of the criminal session.

Lawrence Douglas Jones, 25, laborer, pleaded guilty to burning a barn and was given two to four years imprisonment. The incident is believed to have occurred after a quarrel with the owner of the structure.
