Minister Suffers Fracture Of Skull, Dies As Bantists Meet

Joseph H. Jackson of Chicago, following an all-night election here, was returned to the office of president of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. But the religious body's 8st Annual Session was marred by the death of a Detroit minister who suffered a head injury during a riot involving supporters of Jackson and the Rev. Gardner C. Taylor of New York.

The Rev. Arthur Garfield Wright, 64, died 7 hours after he suffered a skull fracture when he was pushed or fell from the platform, in what was later termed an accident.

Rev. Wright, also a prominent husiness man in Detroit, plunged five feet from the podium to the floor, landing on his head. He remained in a coma and died after doctors at Menorah Medical center performed emergency surgery in an effort to repair brain damage.
