

Pre-Season Confab Opens With Dinner At Fayetteville

FAYETTEVILLE — The annual pre-school, faculty-staff conference at the Fayetteville State Teachers College began on the evening of September 3 with a dinner session and extended through September 11. The six-day series of conferences was woven around this year's theme, "The Challenge of Self-Study and Accreditation in the Improvement of Teacher Education," and each of the lecture-discussions pointed up some aspect of the topic. Following each citation of facts always came the query, "which way

to improvement?" Beginning on Wednesday morning with the keynote address on the matter of the school's accreditation by President Rudolph Jones, there followed an assortment of college-related topics by members of the college faculty and staff. Half Of Bennett's '61 Class Planning To Teach

GREENSBORO — Approximately 50 per cent of the members of the 1961 graduating class at Bennett College will be teaching school this fall, according to a survey just completed.

This year's results follow a continuing employment pattern which finds more and more graduates of liberal arts colleges finding their way into the teaching ranks.

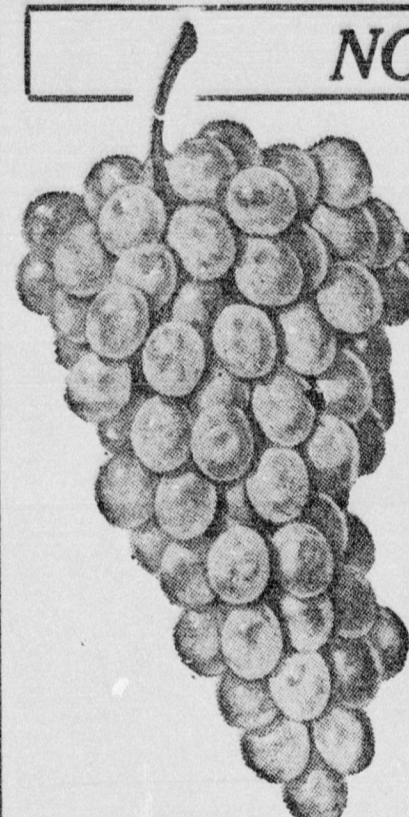

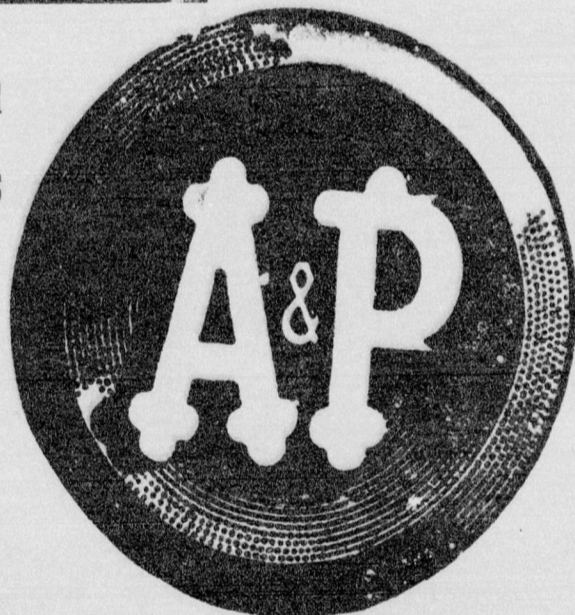

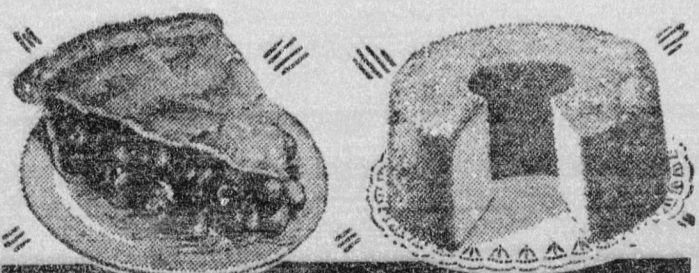
