## THE QUESTION OF CHINESE REPRESENTATION

The controversial issue today is whether Red China be admitted to the United Nations. China is a giant in the East. In this one country alone lives one-fourth of the world's population. In order for you to form your opinion on whether Red China should be admitted into the UN, you must know a little of the history of this controversial question.

The Chinese Communists came to power in government on the mainland in the year 1949. Since that time the question of China's admission to the United Nations has been formally discussed only once. At that time the Assembly defeated an Indian motion to seat Peking in place of Taipei by a vote of 52 to 16. A year later when the question of Chinese representation was brought up the Communist Chinese were at war with United Nations forces in Korea. The Assembly decided to postpone the question for another year.

The "moratorium" policy was begun by this act and the question of Chinese representation has been postponed annually like this ever since.

This policy has been sponsored by the United States and the moratorium policy had its greatest success 47 to 7 with 11 abstentions in 1952. Since then, the policy has been steadily defeated. In 1960 it was passed by only eight votes, 42 to 34 with 22 abstentions. This was the first time it had failed to carry a majority of the Assembly. This was due partly to the large number of abstentions.

On February 22nd, 1961, the President of Brazil instructed his Foreign Ministry to vote in favor of the discussion at the Sixteenth Assembly this fall. This change has also been noticed among the new African states, most of whom are in favor of putting the discussion of China on the agenda.

In this question of Red China there are three proposed solutions or alternatives. A. The seating of both China. B. The simple and unconditional replacement of Taipei by Peking. C. The conditional seating of Peking in place of Taipei accompanied by an expression of the Assembly's understanding that Formosa would remain independent from the mainland of China.

There are two Chinas today. The mainland of China which the Communists control and Formosa, an island some distance from the mainland which is controlled by the Republic of China. Formosa is separated from China by the Formosa Strait which is 90 to 220 miles wide. Peking is the capital of Communist China and Taipei (Taipei) is the Capital of National Formosa.

On February 8, 1961, Lord Home, the British Foreign Secretary, announced that his government believes that facts of international law require the representation of Red China in the United Nations. This has added to the widespread belief that the question on representation will be discussed in the next Assembly.

Recognizing such strong indications of sentiment for discussion on the Chinese question, Secretary of State, Dean Rusk, on June 26, 1961, was quoted as saying that the moratorium was no longer a useful policy. Moratorium: A legal authorization to delay payment of money due, questions, or issues of importance.

The United States has never indicated that China should be kept out of the UN indefinitely. It has opposed the discussion of Chinese representation on the grounds that the Chinese behavior both at home and abroad, has not reflected the spirit of the United Nations Charter. Other members of the UN agree on this point, however, they don't agree that isolation of China is the

right reaction to these circumstances. Prime Minister Nehru of India feels that the proper representation of China in the United Nations is essential and the longer we delay it, the more harm we cause the United Nations and to the consideration of the major problems before us.

Because of its world leadership and strong policies in the past on this question, the United States will have to be careful on the stand it takes on the question of Chinese representation in the United Nations because of its pledge to Formosa.

Whatever plan will be constructed may not be accepted by the General Assembly. It may come to pass that in any case the seating of Red China will be an occasion for the opponents of the United Nations withdrawal. This response may be the spark that precipitates the nuclear war which all nations wish to avoid.

# Judge Hubert T. Delany Gives Address At Chapel Hill Meeting

CHAPEL HILL—Civil liberties—that is, the American traditions of freedom of speech and assembly—must be preserved and strengthened if permanent advances are to be made toward full integration and civil rights. Judge Delany formerly resided in Raleigh, N. C.

This was the message spoken by the Hon. Hubert T. Delany of New York in an address, culminating a Conference on

Freedom and the First Amendment here recently.

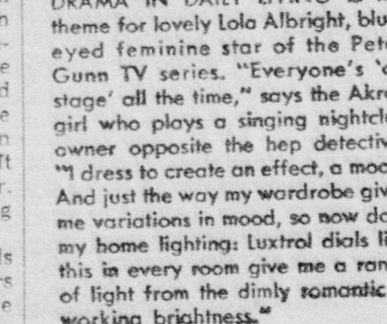
The Conference, sponsored by the Southern Conference Educational Fund, brought together over 250 persons from the Carolinas, Virginia, Georgia, and Alabama. Sessions were held at the educational building of the Chapel Hill Presbyterian Church, and student and faculty delegations from numerous colleges, as well as community leaders from throughout the area, were in attendance.

Judge Delany's address, at the evening session, climaxed an all-day session, during which workshops were held for discussion of the inroads made on free speech and association by the House Un-American Activities Committee, Senator James Eastland's Internal Security Subcommittee, and Southern state committees modeled after them.

Bishop Edgar A. Love, of the Baltimore Area, Methodist Church, was chairman of the conference.
