

## Or. Boulware Says 15,000 **Should Register**

Dr. C. Elwood Boulware, a North Carolina College professor of Mathematics of Durham, speaking before the Raleigh Citizens Association's annual meeting, Feb. 11, 3:30 p. m., stated that there should be at least 15,000 Negro voters in the city of Raleigh, alone. Dr. Boulware said the reason Senator Ervin took the position he did, on Civil Rights legislature is because he know that 95 percent of the Negroes would still be asleep in the May election. Dr. Boulware said if the Negroes would wake up, register and vote: that Senator Ervin would become so liberal that Frank Graham would appear like Senator Bilbo. The Negroes should become concerned about the type of education given their children and should


